Mr. Cappello reported that the 2011 Road Program has begun. They started pavement on Aintree and pavement grinding on the Aintree Park Subdivision.

PARKS & RECREATION – Bill Thomas

Mr. Thomas reported that this past Friday we had the Sixth Annual Mayfield Village Employees' Golf Outing held at Pine Ridge Golf Course under partly sunny skies. A major upset occurred. Last year's championship team of Mayor Rinker, Doug Metzung and friends were beat this year by former engineer for Mayfield Village Steve Hovancsek and George Wilson. The final team standings were first place, Steve Hovancsek's team; second place, Doug Metzung's team; Vince Fuedo and his friends finished third; fourth place was John Marrelli, Ron Wynne and friends; and fifth place was Bill Thomas, Ron Dinardo and friends; and Kim Reilly from the police department and friends came in sixth. We look forward to next year's event on Friday, September 14, 2012.

There was no report.

HUMAN SERVICES – Eunice Kalina

Mrs. Kalina reported that we have already received about 75 applications for snow removal. Letters were received a week ago Saturday. That was a very good response. This Wednesday at 1:00 in the Community Room there will be a free demonstration and people may attend if they wish, a Tai Chi Fan for health and balance. Very important program. We will be starting the week of September 26th a Yoga class and Meditation class on Monday evenings. One goes from 4:45 to 5:45, one goes from 5:45 to 6:45. It's \$54.00 for each class for the six weeks.

PLANNING DEVELOPMENT – Ted Esborn

Mr. Esborn would like to make a couple points about the Resolution that is on the agenda this evening for the State Issue I Infrastructure Bond Program. This is the program through which in 2007 we funded the Beta and Raleigh realignment, the work on Seneca and the Thornapple Pump Station. We have had projects go through this program before. It's a very short window that the Planning Commission gives for this. We have a month from when they roll it out to when applications are due.

This is the first time we have applied since 2007. We are moving to get everything together. It mentions on the agenda that this is Phase I. We list Eastgate, Meadowood, Ravine, Thornapple, Robley and a portion of Wilson Mills. Phase I is projected just to be Eastgate and Meadowood. As of this moment, we are intending just to apply for funding to install sanitary sewers on those two streets. I also want to stress that this Resolution does not involve any expenditure. If we are awarded the grant, there will be a Grant Agreement that is put together in the summer of 2012. This really is just a formality of the application. There will be another agreement if we are awarded the grant.

To supplement what Ted was saying, Mayor Rinker added, we have tried every time we have done this to make sure that the amount each resident would pay is comparable across the community. The variable is always the scope of the work and the extent of the work that has to be performed. So the scope is not just the number of houses that would be hooked up but the nature of the terrain. In our community, a lot of areas where there's bedrock which adds costs, we have found every time we have gone out on this particular neighborhood that that has been a problem. For the number of units that we can hook up, the way it's scored, State Issue I is often very challenging because it looks to who ultimately benefits from it. On the other hand, we are under ongoing regulatory mandates to improve water quality. So we are kind of caught between two different regulatory factors. At the end of the day, every time we have done this, and this is going to be no exception, we try to balance those competing factors so that individual residents end up at about the same point and the combination of grants, contribution from the Village, assessments, loan components, that this all equal out. Again, the real challenge is, in the marketplace it becomes harder to find cost efficiencies in order to make it equal for residents across the board. Ron has already looked at how we can break out a per unit cost looking at inflationary factors since really the mid '90's and beyond that, Tom, John and Doug, collectively are trying to make sure that we spec this in a way that will be as advantageous as we can in the scoring system that they provide to DOPWIC.

ADMINISTRATION – Diane Wolgamuth

There was no report.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Activities Committee – Mrs. Mills reported that the Committee met on September 7th. At that time, we reviewed the 4th of July Celebration and the Summer Concerts. The consensus is that we should have mostly big band sounds at these concerts. Up and coming events are the Santa

Ride on December 3rd, December 4th Tree Lighting, Singing Angels on the 17th and the Menorah Lighting on the 20th. Our next meeting is scheduled for the first week in November.

Architectural Review Board – Mr. Marrelli reported that Architectural Review Board met on the 8th and reviewed the sign package for the Village Mall across the street. The Board came to a consensus. The sign package will go now to the Board of Appeals because there are a couple of signs that are oversized. They will be seeking variances on some minor changes.

Board of Appeals - Mr. Marrelli reported that Board of Appeals will meet tomorrow night at 7:30.

Cemetery – Mrs. Mills indicated that there was no report.

Citizen's Advisory Board – Mr. Marrie stated that there was no report. Our first meeting will be held on Monday, September 26th.

Commission on Aging – Mrs. Kalina stated that there was no report.

Safety and Service – Mrs. Cinco stated that Safety and Service met on Tuesday, September 6th. Most items were on Caucus and are on the agenda tonight. For the Fire Department, we discussed the replacement of the air bags used for emergency rescue and traffic accidents. For the Service Department, they requested the bid for the painting of the slide structure at the pool. They discussed the Greenway Trail route and the additional paving on SOM and Wilson Mills Road. Mrs. Kalina and the Committee discussed the Senior Snow Removal Program for this winter with the bid results and the opt-out program.

Finance Committee – Mr. Saponaro reported that the Finance Committee met on September 12th and also this evening. We had discussions which led to the approval of 6 expenditures. Nine items were also discussed and approved and are on the agenda for this evening.

Historical Society – Mrs. Mills reported that the Historical Society had our ice cream social last Wednesday. I think from what they told me the people that attended prefer to have it at the pavilion so they can tour the Historical House. Because of the prospective road construction, we changed our venue this year. Next year we will have it at the Historical House.

Hillcrest Council of Councils – Council President Buckholtz reported, we will be meeting this Saturday. It will be a program on Reverse 911. Everybody's welcome to attend.

M.A.R.C. – Dr. Parker reported that M.A.R.C. met on Thursday, September 1st at the School Board building. Discussion basically centered around a recapping of summer programs. The Punt, Pass and Kick contest was held on Saturday, September 10th at the High School. The 34th Art Show will be held beginning this Sunday, September 25th through October 22nd at the Library. The next meeting will be October 6th.

Ordinance Review Committee – Mr. Saponaro reported that Ordinance Review Committee met on September 13th. At that meeting, we discussed temporary signage and signage amendments. We have now given that over to the Law Department to put some framework around it. They will be working with Diane on that. We also had a lengthy discussion on enforcement provisions for properties that are in disrepair in our community, our blighted properties. Specifically, we discussed the enforcement issues or lack of or if there are other communities that have something more effective. This is based on a discussion that I had with a resident. I brought it to Diane. Diane is going to look at some of our neighboring communities and other communities to see if we can get some more teeth into the enforcement aspect of our ordinances so that we have better opportunities to make sure that we have these properties that are in disrepair taken care of much quicker. Our next meeting is the October 11th at 5:00 p.m.

Planning and Zoning – Mr. Marquardt reported that there was no meeting. There is no report.

Recreation Board - Mr. Marrie reported that there was no meeting. Our next meeting is Wednesday, September 21st.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Information & Technology – There was no meeting. There is no report.

Records Commission – Mrs. Mills reported that the Commission will be meeting this Wednesday at the Fire Department. In your packets there was a reminder of Community Shred Day which is scheduled for October 15th from 9:00-12:00 here in the parking lot.

Community and Economic Development – Mr. Saponaro reported that a meeting was held on September 6th. At the meeting, there was discussion regarding SKF's potential tenancy at 600 Beta which was looking positive. Mayor Rinker was asked to be the Master of Ceremonies by Dr. Fujita from QED in honor of Dr. Inamori who was the founder of Kyocera Corporation. The next item we discussed was looking at the Police Department solar project. We looked at that in terms of State funding to see if we could reinvigorate that program. The next item we discussed was a proposal for an office building development at SOM and White Road which is the old Midvale property. That will be going before P&Z for initial review likely in October. We also discussed a future crosswalk at Highland and SOM. That's currently being reviewed by Chief Edelman. We then discussed an opinion received from the Law Department regarding the additional permitted uses in particular zoning classifications on Beta Drive. This issue is also going to be reviewed by P&Z. There was a general discussion regarding setting policy for reduced setbacks on Beta Drive and for providing grant funds or incentives to businesses and property owners. We then reviewed the next steps for the Town Center including the clearing of the old Village Hall and Police Department facility. The last item we discussed was the renovation to the Civic Center including creation of Council Chambers, restroom upgrades and a more affordable floor extension for the auditorium to address fire code issues and provide more flexibility to the space.

Are there any questions on anything we discussed? There were none. Our next meeting is going to be on September 26th.

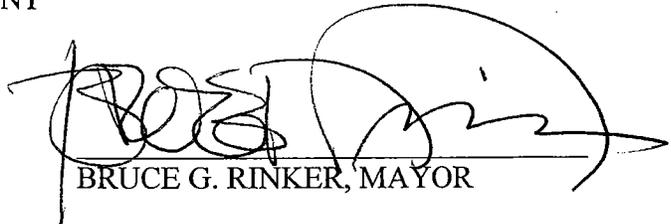
