

SERVICES PROVIDED BY THE POLICE DEPARTMENT:

- CHAD Stickers (Children Have An Identity; safety seat ID)
- Bicycle Licenses (\$1.00)
- Fingerprints (for residents and those employed in MV)
- TTY (also referred to as TDD; a TTY is a device that enables people who are deaf, hard of hearing or speech disabled to use the telephone by typing messages back and forth to one another)
- "Help Save Your Life" Program. (Recording your critical medical information to assist your rescuers could help save your life.)
- EMD - All MV Police Dispatchers are trained in Emergency Medical Dispatch and will provide you with pre-arrival instructions when the situation allows.

SERVICES PROVIDED BY THE FIRE DEPARTMENT:

- Odor Investigation (If you smell gas, burning odors, smoke or anything out of the ordinary, the FD will respond to investigate. We will attempt to identify any hazard present and if possible eliminate it and notify the appropriate agencies.)
- Downed wires (If you notice a wire down in the road, in your yard or anywhere else, notify the FD. We will investigate, determine if there is a hazard, secure the area and notify the appropriate agencies.)
- Carbon Monoxide (If you suspect that you may have CO in your home or if your CO detector is in alarm or making noise, the FD will respond and will check for dangerous levels with our equipment. We will then attempt to isolate the problem, contain and hopefully eliminate the hazard, ventilate when necessary, notify any additional agencies that might be needed and tend to anyone who might be ill.)
- Public Assist (i.e. invalid and shut-in assists.)
- Smoke Detectors and Smoke Detector Batteries (for the elderly, disabled and those unable to provide their own, the FD will provide and install these lifesaving devices at no cost. The FD will also check your existing smoke detector.)
- CPR and Basic Life Support Training (The FD conducts at least one CPR training course a year; available to all residents; free of charge)
- Car Seat Inspection and Installation (By appointment)
- Family Bicycle Helmet Program (By appointment; helmets may be purchased at our cost)
- Public Fire Safety Education (The FD offers ongoing educational programs focusing on Kindergarten and 3rd grade students. A safety program/fire extinguisher training is also offered to MV businesses.)
- Educational Tours and Presentations (Tours of the Fire Station and educational presentations are offered by appointment to groups throughout the year. Residents may stop by during normal business hours.)

RUBBISH REMINDER

J & J Refuse, Inc. collects rubbish and recyclables for MV residents on a weekly basis free of charge. Large items including appliances are also picked up free of charge on your rubbish day. Branches must be bundled and tied in lengths of 4' or less. If you are a new resident, contact Village Hall to find out what day collection is in your neighborhood. Also contact us if you need a recycling bin or a brochure describing acceptable materials for recycling. This information is also on our website.
 • *The 2004 Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays will not affect collection.*
 Also remember that per Village ordinance, rubbish may be placed at the curb no earlier than 6 p.m. the night before your collection day, or it must be out no later than 7 a.m. on pick-up day.



The gift of freedom *is* our involvement.


Mayfield Village continues to prosper in the face of economic challenges other communities are struggling to surmount. By mid-October, Village revenues surpassed in 10 months the previous record it had taken 12 months to set.

SOM Center Road and its Greenway Corridor are taking shape. Slowly. Though we regret the delays and difficulties this big project has imposed, we are confident in the outcome. And bear in mind that its “completion” will really but mark a point of transition. In laying out this corridor, we are laying the foundation for an aesthetically beautiful, economically dynamic and physically interactive community setting that should long endure. We are literally and figuratively paving the way to even better things. Our thanks to each and every one of you for your patient tolerance.

Our thanks to Mayfield residents who yet again voted their solid support for our excellent public school system. A wise investment, indeed.

This year, a handful of citizens took the initiative of knocking on doors to solicit support for a referendum on term limits for the elected offices of Mayor and Council. The votes to rescind term limits were close, reflecting the gravity of the issue. I have long considered term limits as an individual voter’s choice, to be contemplated without campaign or commentary. In fact, when term limits were proposed in 1995, I did not believe the topic amenable to debate. I would like to think that a term of office presents the officeholder sufficient opportunity to prove himself or herself worthy in the eyes of the people for whom the office exists. When the term expires and the time comes for voters to select the officeholder for the next term, the record should provide ample basis for deciding whether to retain the incumbent or choose a new person. I continue to devote my energies to this office, which I have always found to be stimulating, challenging and ultimately gratifying. I thank you for the opportunity.

And finally, on behalf of my family, Laura, Matt, Kristen and Alexa, we love making our home in this, our Village, and we wish each of you a healthy, prosperous and happy Thanksgiving!

The rubbish container test for Kenwood and Oakwood Drives is still in progress. The containers seem to be working well. Decision for Village-wide use will be made in the near future.

Street repair in areas has been completed along with crack sealing. Street repair is evaluated each year as to the conditions of Village areas.

Hope everyone who needs the snow removal service has registered at the Village Hall. If not, please make arrangements as soon as possible.

Villagers can see the progress of the SOM widening. It was hoped that it could be completed by the end of this year. The delays of utilities installation etc. have caused many delays. Fire Department

Fire Safety and Persons Older than 55

As you age, your risk of death from fire increases significantly. Practice safe smoking, safe cooking, and safe heating in your home. With a little fire safety know-how you can help save lives from unintentional fire death, including your own.

Smoking

Sitting in your favorite chair and having a cigarette after dinner seems to some like a great way to relax — but cigarettes and relaxing can be a deadly mix. Falling asleep while smoking can ignite clothing, rugs and materials used in upholstered furniture. Using alcohol and medications that make you sleepy compounds this hazard.

Careless smoking is the leading cause of fire deaths and the second leading cause of injuries among people ages 65 and older. Cigarettes continue to burn when they are not properly extinguished. When a resting cigarette is accidentally knocked over, it can smolder for hours before a flare-up occurs. Before you light your next cigarette, remember:

- ✓ Put your cigarette or cigar out at the first sign of feeling drowsy while watching television or reading.
- ✓ Use deep ashtrays and put your cigarette all the way out.
- ✓ Never smoke in bed.
- ✓ Don't walk away from lit cigarettes and other smoking materials.
- ✓ Don't put ashtrays on the arms of sofas or chairs.

Cooking

Many families gather in the kitchen to spend time together, but it can be one of the most hazardous rooms in the house if you don't practice safe cooking behaviors. Cooking is the third leading cause of fire deaths and the leading cause of injury among people ages 65 and older.



It's a recipe for serious injury or even death to wear loose clothing (especially hanging sleeves), walk away from a cooking pot on the stove, or leave flammable materials, such as potholders or paper towels, around the stove. Whether you are cooking the family holiday dinner or a snack for the grandchildren:

- ✓ Never leave cooking unattended. A serious fire can start in just seconds.
- ✓ Always wear short or tight-fitting sleeves when you cook. Keep towels, potholders and curtains away from flames.
- ✓ Never use the range or oven to heat your home.
- ✓ Double-check the kitchen before you go to bed or leave the house.

Escape Plan

If you don't have an escape plan, how are you going to safely escape your home when a fire occurs? How will you know that your loved ones are safe? Where is the proper place to call 9-1-1? Just a few minutes of planning can prevent a lifetime of regret.

Draw a diagram of your home,

marking all windows and doors, and plan two routes out of each room. Make sure to routinely practice the escape plan. Preventable fire deaths can be reduced if families arm themselves with a map and a plan:

- ✓ Practice finding your way out of the house with your eyes closed, crawling or staying low and feeling your way out of the house.
- ✓ Never open doors that are hot to the touch.
- ✓ Teach your family to stop, drop to the ground and roll if their clothes catch on fire.
- ✓ Designate a meeting place outside and take attendance. Get out and stay out.
- ✓ Remember to escape first and then notify the fire department.

Heating

There are more home fires during the winter months of December, January and February than any other time of year. Heating devices like space heaters and wood stoves make homes comfortable, but they should be used with extra caution. Heating is the second leading cause of fire death and the third leading cause of injury to people ages 65 and older.

Many of these deaths and injuries could be prevented with safe heating practices. So, before you grab a good book and cozy up to the fireplace, make sure you do the following:

- ✓ Space heaters need space. Keep flammable materials at least three feet away from heaters.
- ✓ When buying a space heater, look for a control feature that automatically shuts off the power if the heater falls over.
- ✓ Keep fire in the fireplace by making sure you have a screen large enough to catch flying sparks and rolling logs.



Smoke Alarms

When a fire breaks out, you have only seconds to escape its heat, black smoke and deadly gases. You can dramatically increase the chances of surviving a fire simply by installing and maintaining working smoke alarms in your home. This life-saving device can help alert you and your family to a fire and increase time needed for escape.

Follow these simple tips to help make your home a safer place:

- ✓ Place a smoke alarm on every level of your home and outside bedrooms. If you keep your bedroom doors closed, place a smoke alarm in each bedroom.
- ✓ Check smoke alarms monthly by pushing the test button. If you cannot reach the button easily, use a broom handle.
- ✓ Change the batteries in your alarms at least once a year - perhaps when you change your clocks for Daylight Savings Time.
- ✓ If cooking smoke sets off the alarm, do not disable it. Turn on the range fan, open a window or wave a towel near the alarm.
- ✓ Smoke alarms wear out over time. Replace yours if it is 10 years old or more.

Building Department

With the all too soon approaching of winter weather, it's not too early to prepare our homes for the winter season.



October is a good time to change the batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors if they are so equipped.

Have your furnace cleaned and checked by a reputable heating contractor to avoid any bone-chilling winter breakdown.

November is not too early to shut off your exterior water faucets and drain the water piping to prevent freezing them.

Make sure your gutters are clear of all leaves and debris. Have your fireplace cleaned and inspected.

A special reminder to those of you who had concrete work done this summer: Avoid using deicing salt or calcium chloride as they promote top surface scaling and spalling during the first year. If at all possible spray a sealer on the concrete to protect it from salt and other chemicals.



Halloween




Adult Sports

The Mayfield Wetland Preserve is a good place to observe seasonal changes. When you read this, we will have long since bade good-by to nature's colorful fall leaves and flowers. Some birds, mammals and

reptiles are hibernating; others have collected a food cache for those times when they may be awakened from deep sleep by a mild temperature day — and can feast on a “snack in bed.” Other creatures remain active. Since January of 2000, the Lyndhurst Municipal Court has provided many educational opportunities to our local schools. Most recently, college students enrolled in legal studies programs as well as criminal justice programs have participated in internship opportunities shadowing **Judge Mary Kaye Bozza** both in the Courtroom and behind the scenes. We encourage students from our local high schools that are interested in their Senior Projects for May of 2005 to inquire as early as January 2005 by contacting **Patti Anderson at (440) 461-6500, ext. 205.**

The Court has revised its local rules of court. For public notification, they have been sent to the Cleveland Bar Association for posting to enable public comment. These local rules of court shall become effective November 15, 2004.

The Lyndhurst Municipal Court's Food Program is rounding its first full year. Defendants selected for our first offender theft program are permitted to donate a food box in lieu of actual community service hours. We are proud to report since January of 2004 almost 100 food boxes have been distributed to needy families in our jurisdiction through local civic groups and churches.

The Court has been designing a web site, which is now in its final preparation stage. We anticipate its accessibility to the public in December 2004.

Another successful **“Make the Right Choice”** presentation to driving under the influence offenders was held on October 1, 2004.



Our next program will be scheduled in January 2005. We encourage students from local schools to attend for alcohol prevention education.

Judge Bozza has been asked by the Ohio Department of Safety and the Ohio Supreme Court to participate in a pilot program to create a specialized driving under the influence docket. The pilot program is intended to provide intensive treatment and intensive probational supervision to those with long-standing alcohol addiction problems relating to their driving histories.






Hanover Woods Homeowners' Association
