# 2014 State of the Village

## Memo from the Mayor / Bruce G. Rinker

Since increasing Mayfield Village's income tax rate from 1.5% to 2% in 2010, we have kept our promise to use the increased tax revenue for five specific purposes:

1. To increase **reserves**;
2. To **reduce our debt**;
3. For **tax base enhancement**;
4. For **operations**, to continue to provide the level of service residents expect; and
5. To keep improving our **infrastructure**.

Once again, I have left the economic analysis to Finance Director Ron Wynne.

Our overarching policy continues to be to stick to advancing the goals of each of these categories in the belief that they advance the quality of life in Mayfield Village prudently. We continue to reduce our debt methodically, while substantially multiplying our reserves. We keep a watchful eye on our tax base, always looking to diversify, yet sustain blue-chip businesses. We continue to sustain a high level of essential public services, while expanding program offerings for all ages and tastes. We continue to invest significantly in infrastructure. Between May, 2010, when voters approved the rate increase, and this coming December 2014, the Village will have expended over \$9.4 million to rebuild streets, convert from septic to public sanitary sewers, update street signs, install sidewalks, and upgrade traffic signals.

2013 ushered in a beautiful and functional new Library that appears to be constantly busy. I recently received statistics on visitors and circulation since the Library's opening. The average monthly visitors total 32,664 with circulation numbers consistently over 65,000 items per month, with a high of over 94,000 items in July of 2013. Re-

member that the Library was constructed with funds generated by a County-wide levy; the Village and Progressive donated the land; and the Village assisted with the construction of the entry drive off SOM. Now that we have some experience with how the entryway is functioning and the level of traffic, plans for lighting the driveway and adjusting the median to create an easier turn are underway.

Construction of the paved all-purpose trail that runs through Beta Drive and connects the center of town to our recreational areas began in late 2013 and will be completed this year. Boardwalks over wetland areas have already been installed and the bridge over Beechers Brook is being put in place right now. This project received over \$1 million in Federal funding and over \$250,000 in land value donated by local businesses.

Streets in the Hanover Woods neighborhood will be repaved this summer and the installation of sanitary sewers on Eastgate and Meadowood Drives will begin.

We continue to work towards a plan to create a 4-way intersection at Wilson Mills and Miner Roads that will relocate the primary entry to Mayfield High School. Existing structures are being removed. We believe the geometry of a new intersection will vastly improve traffic safety.

Plans to rehabilitate the Community Room also continue. A conceptual design and cost estimate have been prepared and an architect will be selected to prepare the plans necessary to bid this project.

I remain confident that with our continued focus on the five fiscal policies articulated in 2010, Mayfield Village will continue to be a thriving and sustainable community.

## Tax Dollars at Work

In May 2010, Mayfield Village placed an issue on the ballot requesting that voters approve an increase in the income tax rate from 1.5% to 2.0%. During the months that preceded the vote, we held several town hall meetings and distributed various pieces of informational literature that addressed how these additional tax monies would be spent.

We identified five specific categories to which the funds would be directed and we continue to target those areas. Following is more detail about how these monies were spent in 2013 and have been budgeted for in 2014.

**DEBT RETIREMENT** – This category refers to the principal and interest payments the Village is required to make annually on its outstanding notes and bonds. Incremental tax dollars allocated were \$700,000 in 2013 and \$400,000 in 2014. **We are paying down debt quicker.**

**RESERVES** – This category refers to the Village's "Rainy Day Fund" or savings account. It represents monies set aside only to be tapped in the event of absolute necessity. Our initial goal was to have \$4 million in reserves. During 2013, our reserves increased by \$555,000 to \$10.7 million. Our budgeted reserves as of Dec. 31, 2014 are \$10.5 million.

**INFRASTRUCTURE** – This category refers to the Village's roads, sewers, sidewalks, facilities, etc. During 2013, we spent \$1.3 million on infrastructure projects which included the Kenwood Road Program (\$1.1 million) and Phase 2 of the Highland Road sidewalk (\$98,000). For 2014, \$5.1 million has been allocated to cover the following major projects: Eastgate/Meadowood sewer conversion (\$2.8 million), Hanover Woods Road Program (\$1.1 million), replacement

of traffic signal mast arms (\$510,000) and extension of the SOM Center sidewalk (\$140,00).

**TAX BASE ENHANCEMENT** – This category refers to expenditures that benefit existing and attract prospective residents and businesses. During 2013, we spent \$859,000 on tax base enhancement projects which included the Greenway Corridor (\$358,000), the Soccer Field restrooms (\$349,000) and improvements to The Grove (\$57,000). For 2014, \$324,000 has been allocated, which includes the following major projects: Greenway Corridor (\$144,000) and electrical infrastructure at The Grove (\$75,000).

**OPERATIONS** – This final category refers to the day-to-day operations of the Village. It includes the cost of personnel, equipment, vehicles, programs, etc. During 2013, we spent \$561,000 on equipment and vehicle needs, which included the purchase of a new ambulance (\$217,000). For 2014, \$1,023,000 has been allocated and includes the following major items: Fire Pumping Truck (\$450,000), Police vehicles and video recording equipment (\$210,000), and Service equipment and vehicles (\$175,000).

In summary, since 2010, the Village is projected to achieve the following key financial results by the end of 2014:

- Increased Debt Retirement of \$2 million;
- Increased our "Rainy Day Fund" by \$8.7 million;
- Completed Infrastructure projects totaling \$9.4 million; and
- Completed Tax Base Enhancement projects totaling \$1.7 million.

## Mayfield Village Financial Position

There has been a lot of recent press on the issue of citizens' access to the ballot. Most of the fight seems to be from our fine County of Cuyahoga. As the most populated county in the state, we of course have issues that other counties may not in reference to ease of voting: traffic, multiple polling locations, long lines, family/work obligations, etc. Here is an excerpt from one of three recent additions to law, Substitute Senate Bill 205:

"The secretary of state may mail unsolicited applications for absent voter's ballots to individuals only for a general election and only if the general assembly has made an appropriation for that particular mailing. Under no other circumstance shall a public office, or a public official or employee who is acting in an official capacity, mail unsolicited applications for absent voter's ballots to any individuals."

Cuyahoga County Executive Ed Fitzgerald claims that the county has home rule authority under the Ohio Constitution to mail unsolicited ballots. At one point, the state said it was an issue of money, and Fitzgerald retorted that Cuyahoga County would pay for it itself. He referenced polling issues in 2012 that we can fix by broadening access to the polls. The next piece of legislation of concern is Substitute S.B. 216, which changes some of

the provisional voting regulations.

"Provisional ballots are used to record the vote if the voter's eligibility is questioned at the time of casting."

According to The Plain Dealer, Amended S.B. 238 eliminates the so called "Golden Week," in which citizens could register to vote, apply for, and cast absent voter's ballots at the same time. Unfortunately, many of these directives seem to be drawn at party lines. State republican officials are for these changes, while state democrat officials believe they should be less restrictive. However, I have found locally that some democrats agree and some disagree that their voting rights are being restricted, and this divide is also found among local republicans. As an elected official and a strong believer in the right to vote, DO NOT let politics get in the way of politics. Get out there and exercise your privilege!

Spring is finally here and along with the budding flowers and trees, we also see children on bikes and scooters, playing in yards and driveways and unfortunately sometimes, running into the street without warning. Let's keep our eyes and ears open and attentive, rather than talking on our phones or texting (which, by the way is illegal). And since we're paying attention anyway, let's watch out also for motorcycles, orange barrels and construction zones.

I would like to remind everyone about our Code Red emergency notification system. This allows the Village to advise you of any hazard or emergency in the areas surrounding your home. You can receive the notifications via your home phone, cell phone, text or email. If you haven't signed up yet feel free to contact the police department and we'll be happy to assist. (Incidentally, we already have any phone number published in the White Pages, but if you want the above additional notifications you'll have to sign up.)

At a recent meeting of SPAN police chiefs and mayors, discussion was had regarding updates on dispatch consolidation. The area police and fire chiefs are looking at various options. One of those options would be to host a consolidated center here at the Mayfield Village police station. Fire Chief Carciop-

olo and I have been working closely together on this project at the behest of Mayor Rinker. We hope to bring further news of this project in the coming months.

Lastly, just a reminder if any residents are interested; the police department continues to host the Handgun Safety/Concealed Carry classes. I truly believe that the better educated we are, the safer we become. This is a service we provide to you, the residents of Mayfield Village. We have held four classes thus far and have received a lot of positive feedback.



## Restrictions on Outdoor Fires

If your yard is like mine it took a real beating after the harshest winter in nearly 20 years. Complicating the situation was the late onset of spring, which served to further delay any clean up and prep work I was planning. Eventually I got out there and raked, scooped, and hauled all that debris out of my yard but there was so much of it. Fortunately, I have room to dump this material on my property so that it decomposes naturally, however many of you don't have this option and must find other methods of disposal.

A popular method to dispose of yard waste is to burn it, however this method is not permitted under both state and local statutes. Local ordinances mirror state laws restricting the fuel, size and location of outdoor fires. The intent of the laws is to ensure that recreational outdoor burning is conducted in a safe, responsible manner with a minimal negative impact on the environment and your neighbors. The outdoor burning laws require that only clean, seasoned firewood, natural gas, or equivalently clean burning fuels are used. The burning of yard or landscape waste including but not limited to stumps, tree trimmings, leaves, grass, shrubbery, and crop residues is not permitted.



The location of your outdoor fire in relation to combustible structures like your home, tool shed, fences and play sets is also regulated as is the size of the fire. Recreational fires cannot be conducted within 25 feet of a structure or combustible material. They are also limited by their fuel size, which is restricted to a maximum of 3' in diameter by 2' in height. Portable outdoor fireplaces like those you can purchase at most home centers or discount stores cannot be operated within 15 feet of a structure or combustible material and must be operated in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations. Open flame cooking devices like gas, propane or charcoal grills should not be operated on combustible balconies or within 10 feet of combustible construction and should be operated in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations.

Don't forget to always have a means of extinguishment handy as this is also required. A fire extinguisher, garden hose, or a bucket or shovel with sand or dirt readily available is sufficient. In addition, you must always be present when the fire is burning. This means you must be on the premises at all times supervising the fire.

Please keep in mind that the outdoor burning laws also prohibit outdoor burning that is objectionable or offensive to others because of smoke or odor emissions or when atmospheric conditions or local circumstances make such fires hazardous. This means that even though you may be conducting an outdoor fire in complete compliance with the law, you can be required to extinguish it if conditions such as high wind or extreme drought exist or if the smoke is disturbing others.

In summary, remember that yard waste, rubbish or trash cannot be burned outdoors. Outdoor fires are permitted as long as they are conducted in accordance with local and state laws and are not creating a hazard or a nuisance, are not objectionable, are located safe distances from combustible structures, use only approved fuel, and are constantly attended.
