Honoring Those Who Serve

Memo from the Mayor / Brenda T. Bodnar

Editor's Note: Below is a reprint of the comments made by Mayor Bodnar at this year's Memorial Day Ceremony held on May 28 at Whitehaven Memorial Park.

Ladies and gentlemen, it is my privilege to come before you today to remember and honor those who have given their lives in service to our country. It is humbling to acknowledge the debt of gratitude that we owe to all of the men and women who put themselves in harm's way every day to protect us.

To whom much is given, much is expected. We've all heard that admonition. And certainly, here in the United States of America, I think we can all acknowledge that we have been given so very much.

We enjoy incredible freedoms here – even though we hardly think about them as we go about our daily lives. When we wake up in the morning, we pick up the paper or tune into whatever news broadcast we choose, and learn, fairly accurately, what is happening in our community and in our world. And if we don't like what's happening, we have the freedom to congregate with whomever we please, to voice our opinions and to work toward righting wrongs that we see.

We send our children off to good schools where we know they will receive a strong education that will help them transition to adulthood and provide them with tools for successful lives and careers.

We can choose our religion or no religion at all.

But what if we didn't have all these things? What if our government controlled all our news outlets and denied us access to news from other parts of the world? What if we were made to pay homage to a king or a dictator we didn't believe in? What if our government barred us from having more than one child? Left us to

starve while hoarding all of the food and resources to an elite few? Or imprisoned us if we disagreed with our government officials? What if we had to hide our religious affiliation in fear that, if discovered, we would be removed from our homes and sent to camps where we would die under the most horrible circumstances imaginable.

All of these things have happened in history, and indeed they still happen around the world today, but the freedoms that form the basis of our democracy protect us from these atrocities. These freedoms, bought by the blood of American soldiers in the Revolutionary war, have been passed down from generation to generation of Americans, while the ransom for them has been paid by generation after generation of those who have so faithfully served in our military.

It is this group, a group of ordinary men and women whose courage and fearless determination led them to extraordinary and selfless acts, who we honor today.

From the soldiers who fought to secure our independence and establish this great democracy, to every soldier who has fought through hunger, extreme cold or heat, and disease, to every one who marched through deserts, swamps, jungles and sandstorms, who was wounded by musket, cannon, landmine, rifle, missile or chemical agent, who was forced into death marches or POW camps, to every soldier who has carried a wounded comrade to safety or an expired comrade to a place of dignified rest, to every man and woman who, as the song goes, has marched into hell for a heavenly cause, whether it be to protect our Union, preserve peace or elimi-

nate genocide, we thank you today.

And to those who paid the ultimate price, giving their lives in service, we are most humbled and grateful for your sacrifice and we are duty-bound to honor your legacy.

What did these courageous men and women have that led them to give their lives for us? They had whatever weaponry was available at the time; they had boots and helmets and maybe vests, and they had military rations. They had mobile medical units and cots or sleeping bags. But when they left home, they left behind warm beds, home-cooked meals, parents

and spouses, children and unborn babies. Yet without these things we take for granted, they were able to act with great courage.

I suggest to you that the intangible things they carried with them, the love of country and family, the belief in the freedoms that underlie our democracy, and the knowledge and faith that there is a brotherhood and sisterhood among soldiers – a sacred pact to fight for each other, take care of each other, and if need be to escort each other back home, that gave, and continues to give, our soldiers the strength and courage they need.

Those who gave their lives in service to our country didn't set out to be decorated war heroes. They simply rose to the occasion, acting with courage and humility when their time came. As a young naval officer in WWII, John F. Kennedy was asked about his heroic actions in saving 11 men after a Japanese destroyer rammed Kennedy's PT boat, splitting it in half, sending wounded men into the ocean and causing a fuel spill which ignited and burned several of the men. Kennedy, who himself suffered a ruptured spinal disc in the collision, commented on his actions as follows: "It was involuntary," he said. "They sank my boat."

We know, of course, that Kennedy's actions, and the actions of all of our men and women in uniform, are the result of a choice – a choice to stand for American ideals, to serve our country and protect our freedoms, and to preserve life, even at the expense of their own.

So what is our mission, then? How do we repay the ransom that our soldiers have paid with their own blood? I suggest to you that, each time we send a soldier off to battle, we make with them a pact – a pact to honor their service by working to protect and preserve what they stood for. Whether in our daily lives or on a battlefield, we must continue the fight for freedom and democracy and not let down our guard. We must live as one indivisible nation, and we must stand for liberty and justice for all.

In his poem, *In Flanders Fields*, poet John McCrae assumes the voice of soldiers who died at war and are buried in that field:

"Take up our quarrel with the foe," they command us.

"To you from failing hands we throw

The torch; be yours to hold it high."

I am fortunate to be here with all of you today, and especially to be in the company of two fine young men, one who has served our country well and one who is about to embark on that mission. The torch is being passed.

Mr. James Shelby, who is 100 years young, served our country in World War II as a United States Army paratrooper in both France and Germany. In his four years of distinguished service, Mr. Shelby earned a purple heart and not one, but three bronze stars. Purple heart awards go to soldiers who have been wounded or killed in combat. Bronze stars are awarded to members of the US Armed forces for heroic achievement or

service, or meritorious achievement or service, in a combat zone. Mr. Shelby, you embody the best of what America has to offer, your service and bravery have made us stronger and better, and we are proud to have you as a citizen of Mayfield Village, Ohio. Please join me in thanking Mr. James Shelby for his courageous service to our country.

And now I am proud to share this moment with a young man who has accepted the torch and will soon leave to serve our country as a proud member of the United States Marines. I would like to read a proclamation of appreciation to Gunnery Sergeant Josecarlos Mendez.

WHEREAS, the youth of our nation are of paramount importance to the future of this great country; and

WHEREAS, the Young Marines is a youth education and service program for boys and girls which fosters the mental, moral and physical development of its members. The Young Marines promote a healthy, drug-free lifestyle and teach the values of truthfulness, fairness, respect, courage, attention to duty and love of God and Country; and

WHEREAS, Josecarlos Mendez has been a youth volunteer with the Greater Lake County Young Marines, 1st Battalion, Ohio Regiment, reaching the rank of Gunnery Sergeant; and

WHEREAS, Gunnery Sergeant Mendez has volunteered for many past Memorial Day celebrations in Mayfield Village, participating in the ceremonies and helping to place flags at the grave-stones of all veterans at Whitehaven Memorial Park, Union Cemetery and Mt. Sinai Cemetery; and

WHEREAS, Gunnery Sergeant Mendez recently joined the United States Marine Corps., after graduating from Riverside High School in Painesville, Ohio.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT PROCLAIMED that I, Mayor Brenda T. Bodnar, am pleased to recognize Gunnery Sergeant Mendez for his work with the Greater Lake County Young Marines for his dedication and assistance to Mayfield Village. I join with all of you here today to thank him for his past service and wish him the best as he embarks on a career of continued service to our country.

As I close my comments, I will leave you once again with the words of the late John F. Kennedy:

"As we express our gratitude, we must never forget that the highest appreciation is not to utter words, but to live by them."

Ladies and Gentlemen, please enjoy your Memorial Day weekend, remember those who paid for the freedoms we enjoy, and respect and appreciate our men and women in uniform, including our police officers, firefighters and paramedics, all of whom put themselves in harm's way to serve us every day.

Memory Care Facility Considered for “Use” Variance

This past month, the Mayfield village Board of Zoning Appeals granted what is called a “use” variance to a developer who wishes to locate a memory care facility for Alzheimer’s and dementia patients on the Commons Parkway at the north end of the village. The property is zoned for “office-laboratory”, which does not provide for any use such as this. The zoning district mostly allows offices, laboratories, etc. The variance must now go through Village Council and the Planning and Zoning Commission, and a public hearing will be held.

In November 2015, the voters of Mayfield Village voted to allow “use” variances in any non-residential zoning district. A variance is designed and defined to give a property owner approval of a permitted use which is different from or varies from our codified ordinances and other properties in the same zoning district.

Per the new charter amendment, this is the first case requesting such a variance, and therefore your officials and official bodies will be going through the process for the very first time. The charter provides for many precautionary reviews and approvals by different official bodies before such a use variance can be a reality.

The Board of Zoning appeals held an extensive hearing on two different evenings in July, hearing evidence and opinions from both the property owner, the owners of the proposed facility, and the Village administration. The impact on Village services was fully explained and examined by the Board.

Now that the Board has approved the variance, it must go to Village Council for three public readings on three different days, which will continue during August and September. Council will provide 30 days’ advance notice of the public hearing so that

citizens have an opportunity to express their opinion to their Council representatives.

Before Council can vote to approve or deny the variance, they are required to refer the issue to the Planning and Zoning Commission for the Commission to provide to Council their review and recommendations.

Lastly, after Council votes on the variance, should the ordinance pass, it will not go into effect for 30 days in order to allow for members of the public to circulate a referendum petition to prevent the ordinance from going into effect until there is a vote of approval by the electors in Mayfield Village.


As you can see, your 2015 Charter Review Commission provided a multi-layer of protections before allowing a use variance to be granted. The voters in November 2015 confirmed this change to our charter, and it is now the law of the Village.

Open and Concealed Carry Laws

Last Fall, an incident occurred at Parkview Fields involving a man who attended his son's soccer game with a loaded gun in his possession. The man had a Carry Concealed Handgun license ("CCH") and was legally permitted to carry a concealed, loaded handgun on his person. Fortunately, this was an isolated incident that was resolved quickly and without discharge of the weapon, however, it caused many spectators and residents at the fields that day to question whether weapons are permitted in public parks.

In recent years the Ohio Legislature has diminished the ability of municipalities such as Mayfield Village to enact certain local laws under what is known as "home rule" under the Ohio Constitution. The Legislature has the ability to declare that a subject is "a matter of statewide concern", and enact legislation which expressly preempts or negates local laws. In the last ten years or so, examples of the Ohio Legislature preempting local laws include areas such as gas drilling, cable television regulation, the operation of bicycles, and relevant to this discussion, local gun laws. Carrying a concealed weapon was not permitted prior to 2008 and the laws regarding CCW have been changed by the Ohio Legislature six times since that time.

Under current Ohio open carry laws, there are a few places where guns are prohibited, such as government buildings, houses of worship and past airport security checkpoints. Law-abiding citizens can walk down a public street carrying a loaded weapon, can carry a weapon in a concealed fashion and can have a gun in their car. In 2011, the Ohio Legislature changed the open carry law to allow guns in Class D establishments, which includes bars, restaurants and nightclubs. The law originally provided that a gun holder could consume alcohol as long as they are not drunk. It has since been changed so that an individual cannot be consuming alcohol if he or she possesses a loaded gun.

Another area where guns are prohibited is School Safety Zones which includes buildings, school playgrounds, and premises or property

leased by the local School District. As a government building, a local library is also off limits. Similarly, in Mayfield Village, Parkview Pool, the Civic Center, and Community Room are considered government buildings and weapons are prohibited there as well.

When it comes to public parks, the Legislature has created no prohibition. As such, loaded weapons may be carried in a public park, including those owned by the Village and the Metro-parks. Various municipalities were upset by the law and tried to pass stricter local laws, with negative results. In one case, the Ohio Supreme Court struck down a City of Clyde ordinance banning loaded guns in parks. In several other cases involving the City of Cleveland, the Ohio Supreme Court struck down various ordinances which attempted to tighten gun regulation. However, in a twist of law, if a park is owned or leased by a School District, then loaded guns would be prohibited because it would be considered a School Safety Zone.

Private property owners or lessees such as retail establishments and offices can post signs on their property prohibiting the carrying of open or concealed weapons. Violating this prohibition results in criminal charges. However, the law permits an employee to bring a loaded gun to work, even if the employer has posted the property, as long as the employee leaves the gun secured in a vehicle.

It is important to remember that while it may not be common to see people carrying guns in Northeast Ohio, there are other areas of Ohio in which people carry guns wherever they go. In many rural areas in the State, weapons are a way of life. For example, while the gun laws normally prohibit discharging a loaded gun from a vehicle, such conduct is permitted if the shooter has been authorized by a landowner to be on land in an unincorporated township for the purpose of hunting coyote or groundhogs.

If you disagree with the CCH laws as they are currently written and believe that there should be greater or fewer restrictions on carrying loaded weapons, the only way to change the law is to contact your State Representative and/or State Senator about your concerns. Since the Ohio Legislature has intentionally preempted weapons regulation by cities and villages, local legislative bodies are powerless to change the law.

As Judge of the Lyndhurst Municipal Court it is my mission to be a visible example of hard work and dedication, through education, rehabilitation and adjudication, thus creating a greater public service to the citizens served by the Court. My motto is "coraggio vivere con passione." ... "Courage to Live with Passion".

Internships Leah began her internship with Judge Bozza on May 8th. She graduated from Bowling Green University, and in order to receive her diploma this August, she is required to spend 480 hours of study at the Court. She is observing courtroom hearings, arraignments, convictions and sentencing, temporary and criminal protection orders, probation violations, first appearance felony hearings and bench trials. Leah's career choice is to be a Probation Officer.

Senior Search Projects Kaylee from Mayfield High School completed her three week senior search project during the month of April. In her thank you note, she described her experience as one she would never forget because what she learned made her "more excited than ever... to begin my journey... with new knowledge that I learned from you...valuable life lessons...right choices go a long way...I am positive Criminal Justice will be my major". We wish her the best as she embarks on her college education. Brendan from Gilmour Academy began his project at the Court on July 3rd. He is satisfying his requirements for the VECTOR Program during the summer months. Both of these students are gifted students, interested in furthering their education in the Law.

Men and Women's Make the Right Choice Over 65 men attended the Men's Make the Right Choice Program on June 23rd. The speakers presenting at this program were Scott Cyron, Robert Garrity and Jim Gilcrest. Each addressed aspects of the physical, medical, psychological, and legal consequences of being a drug and/or alcohol offender. While talking about their personal experiences, the speakers offered positive avenues toward rehabilitation. Comments from the audience in written responses reveal "*The program works because Judge Bozza cares...the program was supportive, empathetic and encouraging...I think this program is perfect and I personally needed to hear this...*"

The Women's Make the Right Choice Program took place on July 14th. There were more than 40 women in attendance convicted of drug and or alcohol offenses. Juanita Hivner, Barb Gantous, and Angie Bronick have been routine presenters to the women at these programs. Two written comments made after the program which summarize its essence, are as follows: "*Judge Bozza has given women a chance to better themselves and realize you can survive adversity and tragedy...A++Judge Bozza*", "*Thank you for giving me the opportunity to come today. It opened my eyes, taught me things and gave me the knowledge and confidence to grow and achieve my goals.*" These Men and Women's programs were established in 2002. They are a mandatory part of the offenders' sentences, and they are an integral part of the rehabilitation process that our Probation Department monitors.

Parents' Make the Right Choice This outreach program was planned in 2012 as a response to the changing needs of the community due to the opi-

ate epidemic. Our first program took place in February of 2013 and the Court sponsors three meetings per year. Our next meeting is scheduled for September 21, 2017. All parents who are suffering from this opiate addiction are welcome, provided that they call Tina at 440-461-6500 ext. 166. We serve a light dinner and it is important for us to plan accordingly.

Civic Groups On Thursday, June 22, 2017 Judge Bozza addressed the Aberdeen Homeowners Association at the request of the President Robert Poelking. She had an opportunity to discuss the Court's State of Affairs and present the essence of her Community Outreach Programs called Make the Right Choice which have evolved over the years responsive to the changing needs of our community. The Judge participated in two Make the Right Choice Senior Safety Programs; one on June 29th to the tenants at Sherri Park Apartments affiliated with the Jewish Federation hosted by Activities Coordinator Patty Keating, and one on June 30th at the Bethany Covenant Church in Lyndhurst hosted by Dolly Shutzman. Judge Bozza was the guest speaker at the Kiwanis Scholarship Dinner on July 20th. Congratulations to the four recipients Czarina, Tina, Trevor and Anna for their excellence and achievements, as they continue their educations.

The City of Highland Heights through its Police Department anticipates launching a Citizens' Academy this fall. Judge Bozza was asked to participate in the education portion that involves the Court and Criminal Justice matters. She has previously addressed the members of the Mayfield Heights Citi-


