Around the Village—Accomplishments, Challenges and Goals

Memo from the Mayor / Brenda T. Bodnar

In 2018, we continue to enjoy the same moderate and steady increase in our income that we have seen over the past several years. What that means is that our business base is stable and profitable. Our businesses are thriving, growing and expanding, and new businesses have moved in. We don't have a great deal of space available for growth and expansion, and we are facing new challenges to find or create new space so that our businesses can continue to thrive here. (That is a good challenge to have.)

To help us with these challenges, we have hired Economic Development Manager John Marquart. John has only been with us for a few weeks, but is already hard at work maintaining and strengthening strong, positive relationships with our businesses, as well as with neighboring communities. In addition, John will be doing some grant writing, real estate inventories, and networking with other branches of government to best position Mayfield Village for continued economic success. In the short time John's been with us, he has already impressed us with knowledge, skill and thoroughness and we are very happy to have him as part of our team.

Our Finance Director, Ron Wynne, keeps a close eye on our income and expenses. Under Ron's guidance, our reserves have steadily grown. As of September 30th, our reserves stand at approximately \$21 million, well above state recommended amounts. Because our financial position is so strong, we were able to provide some relief to taxpayers by eliminating the annual street light assessment. This represents a

savings to taxpayers of approximately \$85,000 per year.

In spending our money, we focus first on safety, services and infrastructure. When we spend money on state of the art equipment and training for our first responders, we are investing in the well-being and peace of our entire community.

This year we are nearing completion of our final septic to sanitary conversion project along Robley, Thornapple and parts of Wilson Mills. To all of the area residents, as well as residents of Hanover Woods and local commuters, we appreciate your patience and understanding. It has not been easy to endure all of the road conditions, detours and road closures, and even water main breaks and water shut-offs. We have worked diligently with the contractor and the water department to resolve issues as quickly and painlessly as possible, and we appreciate your notifications to us along the way.

Just a heads up—next year we plan to resurface Wilson Mills east of SOM, and that's going to require some patience too – hopefully for a shorter time period.

Work on our intergenerational park was slowed down this summer due to some issues with the project. Fortunately, we are working things out and work should be resuming soon.

We have had the pleasure of working with the Sewer District on two successful projects this year. The District has pretty much completed its restoration of the Beecher's Brook stream bed just south of SOM Court. The District corrected the

severe erosion problem in that area and moved the stream bed to the south, with both practical and beautiful results. They will still be monitoring the area and doing some additional plantings.

With financial assistance from the District, we are also nearing completion of a stormwater basin expansion project at the corner of SOM and Highland Road. The purpose of that project is to increase stormwater retention capacity and reduce some of the flooding that occurs on Beta Drive when there are heavy rains. The District is using our community cost share dollars to help with that project.

Safety-wise, we've added a mast arm at Wilson Mills and Joyce to prohibit left turns into Joyce during rush hours. By spring, we should also have installed a traffic signal and cross walk at Hickory Hill and SOM, directly across from the library drive, and then adding a sidewalk to the north which can connect to the Greenway Trail, so that pedestrians and bicyclers can get to the softball fields, pool, Grove, soccer fields, and some brand new tennis and sand volleyball courts.

One of our proudest additions this year is our First Responders Memorial, incorporating a 17' tall steel beam from the World Trade Center that Fire Chief Gino Carcioppolo acquired for us. That beam is flanked by two granite spires, representing the Twin Towers. The Memorial is just to the north of the fire station, and includes dedicated parking as well as a separate area for flag ceremonies and other patriotic occasions. If you haven't seen it yet, I invite you to stop by and visit. I recommend you come see it at sunset, because the sun setting behind the memorial is a very moving visual.

We've made some improvements to The Grove this year, adding the wall and green room to the right of the stage, and also entryway walls and signage. Most notably, our lineup, both at The Grove and Gazebo, included some very popular cover bands, groups like the Eagles, Journey and Creedence Clearwater Revival, which drew huge crowds. We owe a big thank you to our Recreation Director Shane McAviney for our successful season. Next year we would like to increase some areas of level seating, especially for the many seniors who enjoy our concerts, and we are also looking at ways to increase restroom capacity without breaking the

bank. I hope I see you at The Grove and the Gazebo next summer.

Next year we will also be working on our Civic Center to make it ADA compliant. By adding an elevator, we will also be opening up spaces on the second floor and basement for new uses.

Finally, looking ahead, most of you know we are working on a new Master Plan to guide us over the next 10 or so years. In working with the community, we have found a common theme: our residents are very happy with the Village as it is, and virtually everyone here wants to remain a Village. Although we don't have much available space, there is some concern that new developments could take us over the limit. (We are currently at about 3400 residents, having gone down in residential population by almost 200 over the last 35 years. It takes a population of 5000 or more to be a city.) Rest assured that there is no plan or goal to take any action that would cause us to lose our status as a Village. We must recognize that planning for the future is planning for success. While we may disagree on the particulars, our ability to address change, and to embrace it will foster our success, safety and well-being as a Village without jeopardizing the character of the Village we love. Proactive is always preferable to reactive.

Presently, we have one small area – the SOM Court *cul de sac*– that was rezoned several years ago to “planned residential development,” which allows attached residential units under a strict set of rules. SOM Court was rezoned by vote. We have maintained referendum zoning here and I strongly support that.

Currently, a developer is looking to rezone some property along Highland Road to a planned residential development community with about 60 units, and we are working with him and residents of Highland Road to see if we can put together a development agreement that would be good for the Village as well as good for the developer. We don't really have areas for senior independent living, so this could be an opportunity to provide for that. Whether that property is rezoned, however, will be subject to your vote.

And speaking of voting, please take the time to vote on November 6. Our right to vote is fundamental, and no matter what our politics are, when we exercise our right to vote we are working together to preserve our great Democracy.





Reminders About Autumn Leaf Pickup

The Service Department will begin curbside leaf pickup in mid-October and will continue through early December, weather permitting. As you and your landscapers perform autumn cleanup, please keep the following in mind:

- Leaves should be raked to the tree lawn and placed as close to the street as possible.
- Branches, twigs and grass may not be mixed with your leaf piles as they will clog and damage our equipment.
- Leaves should not be placed in street circles. Please keep them on your tree lawn.
- Please place leaf piles away from mailboxes and light poles.
- There is no set schedule for leaf pickup. Leaves on all Village streets will be collected at least once per week.
- There will be no spring leaf collection.

Don't forget to call the Service Department at 440-442-5506 beginning in March 2019 to put your name on the mulch delivery list. Each residence is permitted a maximum of 4 yards of mulch, delivered free of charge. Delivery ends at the end of May and is scheduled on a first-call, first-served basis.

Legal Update

The "Move Over Law" Effective 10/29/18 Amended Senate Bill 127

When a driver approaches a stationary waste collection vehicle that is displaying flashing, oscillating, or rotating lights, the driver must either: (1) if on a highway or road that has two lanes of travel in the same direction, proceed with due caution and, if possible and with due regard to the road, weather, and traffic conditions, change lanes into a lane that is not adjacent to that of the waste collection vehicle; or (2) if on a highway or road with a single lane of travel in one direction, proceed with due caution, reduce speed, and maintain a safe speed for the road, weather, and traffic conditions.

Concealed Handgun License Law Change Effective 11/5/18 Senate Bill 81

Waives the license fee for applicants who are active or reserve members of the U.S. armed forces, or who have retired from or were honorably discharged from U.S. military service. Also permits any licensee to renew a concealed handgun license at any time before the license expires, eliminating the previous 90-day renewal window.

Conviction Record Sealing Law Effective 10/29/2018 / Substitute Senate Bill 66

Under the bill, in addition to the category of offenders who currently are "eligible offenders" for purposes of the Conviction Record Sealing Law, the term also includes anyone who has been convicted of one or more, but not more than five, fourth or fifth degree felonies or misdemeanors, provided that none of those offenses are an "offense of violence". If an eligible offender of this type has been convicted of two felonies, the offender may apply to seal the record four years after final discharge. If the offender has been convicted of three to five felonies, the offender may apply five years after final discharge. If convicted of one felony, an eligible offender may apply for record sealing three years after final discharge.

Reinstatement Fee Amnesty Initiative Effective 11/2/18 / Substitute House Bill 336

For drivers that owe the BMV reinstatement fees, said fees can be reduced or waived if a driver: (1) has completed all other court-ordered sanctions, (2) at least 18 months have passed since the end of the court-ordered suspension; and (3) the offender demonstrates proof of indigence. Specifies that an offender is not eligible for a reduction or waiver if the offense involved alcohol, a drug of abuse, or a deadly weapon.


Dog Friendly Restaurants Effective 10/29/18 / Substitute House Bill 263

This new law permits a retail food establishment to allow a person to bring a dog in an outdoor dining area. Dogs are not permitted in indoor dining areas. Any establishment that permits dogs in outdoor dining areas must adopt a policy that requires a patron to control his or her dog while at the establishment. A dog owner is also prohibited from bringing a dog into an outdoor dining area if the dog is not properly vaccinated in accordance with all state and local laws. Additionally, this law is not applicable to service animals, which are governed by federal law.

It will be fascinating to see what cat owners across the state have to say about this law.

Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District

Eligible customers can save money on their sewer bills

Any time you flush the toilet or send water down the drain, that dirty water is sent to the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District, where it is cleaned and returned to either Lake Erie or the Cuyahoga River. The bills you receive each month help support this and all other clean water investment in the region.

Did you know the Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District offers cost-saving programs that can help eligible customers pay a reduced rate?

- **Homestead Program:** Available to customers aged 65 or older (or customers under 65 who are totally disabled), this program offers a 40 percent discount. Total household income must not exceed \$33,500 in 2018. The City of Cleveland administers this program and, once applicants are enrolled, they receive an annual renewal form from Cleveland. Applications are available by calling the Sewer District's Customer Service Department at (216)881-8247.
- **Wastewater Affordability Program:** A 40 percent discount for customers whose annual income is at or below 200 percent of the federally-established poverty level. Qualifying customers can be enrolled in the Homestead Program, or the Wastewater Affordability Program, but not both.
- **Plumbing / Sewer Repair Program:** Eligible homeowners meeting income guidelines may receive emergency service line replacements and other plumbing repairs.

The Wastewater Affordability and Crisis Assistance Programs are administered by CHN Housing Partners (formerly Cleveland Housing Network). CHN can be reached at (216)574-7100.

For Mayfield Village residents, the Sewer District charges a monthly base rate of \$4.95 plus \$89.60 for each "MCF" (1000 cubic feet, or 7480 gallons of wastewater) used. A typical household in Mayfield Village uses 0.6 MCF and an average bill is approximately \$59 monthly.

New wastewater rates will go into effect January 1, 2019; the new base rate will be \$6.35 and rate per MCF will be \$95.05.

Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District Customers Eligible for Free Stormwater Consultations

Stormwater is any rainwater or melting snow or ice that flows over the surface of the land to the nearest storm sewer, stream, or lake. Impervious or hard surfaces like driveways, rooftops, and parking lots all pose several stormwater problems. Runoff picks up fertilizer, oil, pesticides, dirt, bacteria and other pollutants as it makes its way over these hard surfaces to storm drains, ditches, and streams. Hard surfaces also make stormwater flow faster, and the rush of stormwater flowing into storm sewer systems when heavy rain falls can back up and cause street flooding. Excessive stormwater runoff entering the regional stream system increases flooding and erosion, reduces water quality, and creates costly problems to communities and their residents. **Unlike water from toilets, showers, and sinks that is filtered through a wastewater treatment facility, anything that enters storm sewer systems or roadside ditches goes directly into our local streams and eventually Lake Erie.**

Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District's (Sewer District) Regional Stormwater Management Program takes a regional approach to address stormwater pollution, flooding, erosion and water quality problems. The Program provides stormwater services throughout the regional stream system and is funded by a fee on customers' Sewer District bills. Your fees are calculated based on the amount of impervious surface area on your property, such as rooftops, driveways, and patios. When property owners make changes or improvements on their properties to reduce the amount of runoff affecting the regional stream system and storm sewers, they may be eligible for a reduction in what they are paying, called a fee credit. Actions like disconnecting downspouts, installing rain barrels, or planting rain gardens are some of the ways you can better control runoff on your property and potentially receive a fee credit.

Chagrin River Watershed Partners (CRWP) is working with the Sewer District to help residential property owners manage stormwater and increase participation in the Sewer District's fee credit program. CRWP can perform free stormwater consultations to assist interested Sewer District customers on:

- Recommending best stormwater control measures (rain barrels, rain gardens, downspout disconnection, pervious pavement, etc.) for your property
- Assisting you with the stormwater fee credit application process
- Addressing other flooding, erosion, or water quality issues on your property

This collaboration between the Sewer District, CRWP, and other local watershed organizations hopes to assist Sewer District customers with better stormwater management on their properties and work towards the Sewer District's goal of fewer flooding and erosion incidents, healthier waterways, and a better quality of life for the Greater Cleveland area!

First Responders Memorial Trailhead

“No Day Shall Erase You from the Memory of Time” – Virgil

It is flanked by two granite spires which represent the Twin Towers destroyed on September 11, 2001.

The Cleveland Firefighters Memorial Pipes & Drums performed and the Mayfield Heights Fire Department Honor Guard joined in the ceremony along with retired Platoon Fire Chief Dave Skrajner who sang the National Anthem.

Members of the Mayfield Village Police Department were on hand to assist with the raising of the flags and retiring the colors. As the sun set at the end of the evening, attendees listened to a Bell Ceremony dedicated to Mayfield Village's fallen First Responders.

Residents are encouraged to visit the Memorial site to remember the sacrifices of the many First Responders who lost their lives in the attack on the Twin Towers and to show appreciation for our own First Responders who remain ready to risk their lives every day to ensure our safety. RECYCLING ALERT!

You may have seen recent media reports about problems facing recycling. These problems include improper or contaminated items making their way into the recycling stream and shrinking markets caused by China's decision to restrict imports of recyclables. **All local communities are now facing increased costs for recycling and your cooperation is needed to keep recycling viable.**

Recycling contamination is caused when a non-recyclable item is placed into a recycle cart. Some examples include food waste, yard waste, garden hoses, syringes, batteries, plastic bags, scrap metal, and shredded paper. These items don't belong in curbside recycling because they are either hazardous, not recyclable, or were not designed to be sorted at the recycling plant. This cost is passed on to our community through price increases. **Please note that the only plastics currently accepted are plastic bottles and jugs, regardless of the number listed on the plastic.**

Shred Day Events

Every year in May, Mayfield Village holds a Community Shred Day Event at the Civic Center. Shredding provides a safe and efficient way to discard documents. This annual event began in 2008, providing residents and businesses the opportunity to destroy personal and sensitive documents in the most secure way possible, safeguarding against identity theft and protecting them from financial fraud. People often keep sensitive, personal documents — like bank and investment statements — long after they need them, making them a target of scam and fraud artists.

Documents are destroyed on-site. Residents and businesses drive up to the shredding truck and volunteers from the Records Commission unload their trunks, placing the documents in a secure bin which then is hooked to the mobile shred vehicle and destroyed on site. Residents are provided with the opportunity to view the documents being shred, providing an extra peace of mind that document security is still a chief priority. Cross-cut shredding methods are utilized by the company, as opposed to most home shredders.

An additional benefit, shredded material is re-used in other products. A few years ago, Council Member Patsy Mills and I toured a shredding facility and they showed us how documents are shred a third time at the facility and prepared for reuse.

The Records Commission conducts this event for the benefit of the residents and businesses of Mayfield Village. This year alone, 4 tons of paper was shred. By recycling 4 tons, 68 trees, 12 cubic yards of landfill, 240 pounds of air pollutants and 80 gallons of water were saved. So, start going through your old unneeded paperwork and bring them to the Civic Center for the next Community Shred Day event on May 18, 2019. Feel free to contact me at 440-461-0862 with questions.

Moving into winter, please ensure that you have working smoke alarms and carbon monoxide alarms. Remember to replace the batteries when you change your clocks in accordance with daylight savings time. When you change your batteries, it is also a good time to determine the age of your alarms. Smoke alarms and carbon monoxide alarms have a definitive lifespan, with smoke alarms being 10 years from the date of manufacturing and carbon monoxide alarms being 5-7 years from the date of manufacturing. The date of manufacturing can be found on the back of the alarm.


