2020 State of the Village

Memo from the Mayor / Brenda T. Bodnar

The Mayfield Village Charter provides that, every April, the Mayor must prepare an annual "State of the Village" report that, at a minimum, advises Council and the citizens of the Village of the finances and administrative activities of the Village during the past year and that may be occurring in the coming year.

Since taking office in 2016, preparing the State of the Village report has consistently given me the opportunity to boast about all the great things happening in the Village. I have gotten to talk about our solid financial condition, tell you about successful grant writing efforts, describe the upcoming capital projects being undertaken to improve and beautify our community, and remark about all the fun and exciting entertainment and recreational programs planned for the summer.

This year, as we deal with COVID-19, things are a little different. The State of the Village remains very strong, but the future is a little less certain, for us and everyone else. As you know, aside from our first responders, most Village staff are working from home to limit the number of employees in our facilities at one time. We are doing our best to support the businesses in our community, but the impact this crisis will have on Village revenues is unknown at this time.

Fortunately, the Ohio legislature passed legislation waiving the "20-day rule" providing that municipal income tax for employees working from home for the duration of the health emergency, plus 30 days, will continue to be paid to the municipality where they would otherwise be working. This should help us retain a significant portion of our income tax revenue. Some of our capital projects and purchases will go forward as planned, but many will be placed on hold while we assess the economic harm caused by the virus.

Most significantly, we remain uncertain about moving forward with all the summer special events and programming. I believe that Ohio Governor, Mike DeWine, has done an outstanding job leading our state through this crisis. He and Dr. Amy Acton have consistently provided calm, proactive, sensible and positive leadership. We have listened to his guidance thus far and will continue to do so as we make decisions about reopening our buildings, parks and playgrounds, and rescheduling special events and programming.

On Friday, March 6, I participated in an informational webinar presented by the County Board of Health regarding COVID-19 and nothing has been the same since. My daily focus, and that of my staff, has been on monitoring the situation by following news conferences, updates, emails, orders and letters from all levels of government, particularly State and County government, which have provided a wealth of information and guidance as we ensure that we are coordinating efforts.

The Cuyahoga County and NEO Mayors and Managers groups have been a tremendous resource and we have regular communications with our neighboring communities to put together plans that will serve us all in the event any of us are left without adequate personnel to meet the needs of our residents. We are all learning how to work remotely, hold virtual meetings, maintain transparency, and continue to serve our communities. We are all committed to helping each other through this.

Mayfield Village is a strong and vibrant community and I fully expect that we will persevere through this challenge as family, friends and neighbors. Even with all the uncertainty, I am proud of our response to this crisis and I am grateful to our Department Heads, Council President Schutt, and members of Council as we work together to deal with the challenges. I am thankful to be working with this team of intelligent, engaged, hard-working and motivated individuals.

2020 State of the Village, continued.

Now for the State of the Village:

FINANCIAL POSITION. 2019 was another strong financial year in Mayfield Village. Our income tax collections totaled over \$20.7 million, an increase over 2018 of almost \$500,000. The vast majority of the Village's revenue comes from income tax dollars paid by those *employed* in the Village; that tells us that our business base is healthy and continues to support the services and amenities enjoyed by residents of Mayfield Village.

Our total general fund revenues for 2019, which include our income tax collections plus interest, land rental income, refunds of tax collection costs, miscellaneous revenues and reimbursements, property taxes and charges for sales and services provided by our Building, Recreation, Fire and Police Departments, totaled almost \$27 million, again posting an increase over 2018 general fund revenues.

In 2019, we received grant dollars totaling almost \$289,000. As you all know, Assistant Recreation Director Danielle Echt recently received almost \$378,000 in grants from the State of Ohio to help fund the Parkview Inclusive Playground Project. These grants are not included in the 2019 number as the grants are reimbursement grants and will not post until 2020. The value of all the grants we receive is significant to our bottom line and I am always grateful to the agencies that provide these grants and to our staff as they successfully secure them.

In 2019, our general fund expenditures, exclusive of year-end transfers, were \$15.9 million. This amount represents an increase in spending of just over \$1.1 million from 2018.

Our general fund balance as of Dec 31, 2019 was \$24.8 million, an increase of about \$3.4 million over our balance on Dec 31, 2018. We ended 2019 with total outstanding debt of \$3.8 million, down from \$16.3 million in 2010. We currently have over \$3 million set aside in the debt retirement fund to pay off our debt early when it is economically beneficial and permissible to do so. The remaining \$800,000 will be paid through TIF payments we receive and then use to pay the related debt as well as ongoing principal pay-

ments on bond debt and money we receive through assessments for sewer conversions.

CAPITAL PROJECTS. The 2020 Capital Projects that are moving forward include:

The Road Program includes concrete road repairs on SOM Center Road, North Commons Blvd., Parkview Drive, White Road, Wilson Mills Road, Highland Road, Lander Road, SOM Court, Bramblewood Lane and Thornsway Drive. CATTs Construction was the low bidder for this project at \$949,831.75. During this period of low traffic volume, Engineer Tom Cappello, Service Director Doug Metzger and Police Chief Paul Matias all concurred that it made sense to have the work completed as quickly as possible. CATTs is following all guidelines issues by OSHA and the CDC regarding COVID-19. CATTs began work on SOM Center Road on April 3 and expects to complete the project by early June.

Parkview Playground. The Parkview Playground project went out to bid and was awarded in February to Licursi Home & Garden for \$868,236.75. In March, work began to remove the old playground equipment and we are well on the way to completion, which is expected by June. With luck, we will be able to open the playground as planned and host a grand opening ceremony to introduce it to all of you. Thanks to landscape architect Jim McKnight for his work on this project and to Assistant Recreation Director Danielle Echt for her vision and effort to obtain funding to make that vision a reality.


Beta Drive Signage. We have long discussed our desire to promote the County's designation of Beta Drive as a County Innovation Zone. Entryway signage will be added to both ends of Beta Drive in an effort to make this designation clear. This project recently went to bid, and on April 20, Council awarded the contract to the Ellet Sign Company for \$54,700.00. Thanks to Mayfield Village resident Allison Markovic for her graphic design work to create a Beta Drive logo that we hope will become iconic to the district. Thanks also to MELD Architects for the continued assistance with creating consistent signage throughout the Village. Keep an eye out! The new signs should be up by fall.

Wilson Mills Sidewalk Extension. At the request of residents in our easternmost neighborhoods, a sidewalk is being added to Wilson Mills Road, from Hanover Drive to Echo Drive, to make it easier for folks to walk to the center of town and access the Greenway Trail and other Village amenities. As you all know, once you make it to the Greenway Trail, you can easily access the Library, Parkview Pool and Playground, our sports fields and The Grove. The contract for this project was also awarded by Council on April 20 and it went to Liberta/Cioffi Construction for \$208,816.00. The sidewalk is expected to be complete by mid-summer.

Civic Center Improvements. Perhaps the biggest project planned for 2020 was to make our Civic Center ADA compliant. This project involves installing an elevator to access the basement and upper floor, broadened doorways and openings, and installing ADA-compliant restrooms to serve the needs of the building, including Reserve Hall. Earlier this year, Council requested that the architect look at the cost of constructing a new building and we were almost done with that process when the Coronavirus hit. As there is much more conversation to be had before making a decision on how to proceed, and until we know the depth of the revenue impact from Coronavirus that we are going to experience this year, this project is being postponed and will be revisited in 2021 or 2022.

The Master Plan. The Master Plan Steering Committee met in February to discuss its status and concluded that the current draft is lacking in direction regarding future zoning and land use. The Committee suggested it would be worth the time and expense to hire a professional planner to assist with this aspect of the Master Plan before presenting it to Council for adoption. The Committee also felt that it was important to include the Town Center in the Master Plan, and pointed out that any major construction of the Civic Center, whether expanding or building new, could significantly impede any future plans for a Town Center. They pointed out that a large investment in the Civic Center would solidify the SW quadrant of the Town Center, likely for at least the next 50 years. They suggested doing the minimal amount needed to upgrade the Civic Center to serve the needs of the community until a comprehensive Town Center plan can be developed and put in place. I concur with their recommendation and the Master Plan is currently on hold while we work on these avenues.

As I have said many times, it is our business base that sustains us. Although we can neither predict the future nor make business

decisions for our corporate citizens, we can and we should make an effort to keep in touch and maintain positive relationships with our business leaders, to facilitate growth and expansion in Mayfield Village. As Mayor, I attend business events, Chamber of Commerce luncheons, Hillcrest Hospital Community Advisory Council meetings and other events which bring government and businesses together to serve our community. We also now have a full-time Economic Development Manager on staff, John Marquart, who is in constant contact with our businesses so that we know what their needs are and are ready to assist. This time is particularly challenging for our small businesses, so John is doing what he can to assist them with applying for SBA loans and anything else we can do to coordinate available resources. You may have noticed a new notice on our LED sign encouraging people to get takeout food from our local restaurants. That is an unusual step for us,

but we want to help our community, which includes our businesses, to weather the storm.

All other Departments continue to run smoothly, albeit remotely, at the current time. As I indicated, in compliance with the Governor's Stay at Home Order, phones have been forwarded to employees' cell phones and emails are checked and responded to regularly. Employees also come in as needed to take care of tasks that they cannot complete at home.

The Recreation Department continues to thrive under the leadership of Parks & Recreation Director Shane McAviney and our facilities and recreational programming remain second to none. This year, programming and entertainment at The Grove and Gazebo are planned but, as of this writing, we await word on whether going forward with the season and other special events will be possible. It may be that some of the programming can be rescheduled later in the summer or, at worst, the 2020 season will become the 2021 season. The new adaptive playground will be a model for inclusive recreation in Northeast Ohio and all of our parks, playgrounds, tennis courts, bocce courts, etc. will be open as soon as it is safe to do so.

The Building Department reported 629 residential building permits issued in 2019 with an increase in construction valuation of \$400,000 over 2018. Work is underway at the Montebello subdivision on Highland Road, so 2020 is expected to show a considerable increase in activity with several new homes, of the 52 planned, being permitted.

Our first responders and dispatchers at Police and Fire remain on the job and ready to respond as needed. Chief Matias is making sure that residents are complying with the current directives to avoid congregating by increasing neighborhood patrols. As a result of the Coronavirus crisis, many Fire Departments are no longer allowing their full-time members to work part-time in other departments. This has made staffing in our own Fire Department more challenging and Chief Carcioppolo requested that we amend this year's budget to add three additional full-time fire-

fighters to our ranks. I agreed with Chief Carcioppolo's recommendation to add staffing, as did Council, and we are moving in that direction.

The Fire Department is also working with our neighboring communities to be ready to reactivate MIPOD. MIPOD stands for Mass Inoculation Point of Dispensing and we last used it in 2009, in response to the H1N1 pandemic. In the event mass testing or mass vaccines become available, the Board of Health will activate the POD and a drive-thru site will be set up at Mayfield High School to test or vaccinate large numbers of people very quickly. Medical and non-medical volunteers are being sought to help with the POD and a registration form for volunteers is available on the Village's website. (See page 14 for more information.)

The Service Department is currently working rotating shifts to minimize the number of employees at the Service Garage. By the first week of May, they will be back at full staffing to take care of grass cutting, landscaping, mulch delivery and other outdoor maintenance.

During this time of crisis, the Community Partnership on Aging has been more important than ever in helping to sustain our seniors. They continue to distribute meals through a curbside pickup model, and Meals on Wheels also continues to deliver meals, with some minor modifications. With the efforts of Senior Programming Coordinator Donna Heath to check on our seniors and the work of our partners, I feel that we are doing what we can to help and make sure they know that we are here to assist them.

We have cancelled all non-essential meetings, rentals and programming through May 10 and will re-evaluate as that date approaches. We cancelled the Easter egg hunt, Mother's Day Pancake Breakfast and all senior programming and events at the Community Room. Of course, full refunds are being issued for all cancelled programs and rentals.

The Ohio legislature has passed temporary legislation to help municipalities comply with Sunshine laws during Ohio's state of emergency. Council is permitted to attend meetings remotely and meetings must be live-streamed to the general public. Our first remote meeting was held on April 20 and we will continue to con-

duct business in this manner until we can again meet in person. The Village took action to declare a state of emergency on March 25 to exercise emergency measures and ensure that the Village would be eligible to receive any available aid. We also passed emergency legislation to increase my spending authority for matters concerning the health, safety and welfare of this community during the crisis. The emergency legislation will remain in effect only through the current state of emergency.



Tough decisions have been made to cancel the Easter Party and Arbor Day Celebration, as well as postpone the Pancake Breakfast that is traditionally held on Mother's Day. Our Council meetings will be held electronically so please join us from your homes.

The annual Town Hall Meeting on Finances that Finance Director Ron Wynne and I host each year will be cancelled this year. On pages 8 and 9, you can find Mr. Wynne's report on the Village's financial position as of the end of 2019. We will be monitoring the revenue situation very closely and making sure we avail ourselves of all available assistance to municipalities from County, State and the Federal government sources.

Please be safe as we get through this challenging time together.

Tax Dollars at Work

In May 2010, Mayfield Village placed an issue on the ballot requesting that voters approve an increase in the income tax rate from 1.5% to 2.0%. Preceding the vote, we identified five specific categories to which the funds would be directed and we continue to target those areas annually. Following is more detail about the five categories of spending and 2019 expenditures:

DEBT RETIREMENT – This category refers to the principal and interest payments the Village is required to make annually on its outstanding notes and bonds. Since 2010, we have reduced our outstanding debt from \$16.3 million to \$3.8 million as of Dec. 31, 2019 – a reduction of \$12.5 million.

RESERVES – This category refers to the Village's "Rainy Day Fund" or savings account. It represents monies set aside to help fund future projects and to be tapped in the event of absolute necessity. During 2019, our reserves increased by \$3.8 million to \$24.4 million. Our reserves as of Dec. 31, 2020 are budgeted to be \$22.5 million.

INFRASTRUCTURE – This category refers to the Village's roads, sewers, water lines, facilities, etc. During 2019, \$3.0 million was committed, which includes the following major projects: Parkview Pool renovations (\$116,000), Fire Department HVAC renovations and roof replacement (\$430,000) and Road Program (\$2.3 million).

For 2020, \$8.4 million has been allocated which includes the following major projects: Civic Center improvements (\$6.0 million), Road Program (\$1.4 million), installation of

Water Main Loops (\$400,000) and Sanitary Relief Sewers (\$500,000).

TAX BASE ENHANCEMENT – This category refers to expenditures that benefit existing and attract prospective residents and businesses. During 2019, \$335,000 was committed, which includes the following major projects: Parkview Complex signage (\$41,000), SOM and Wilson Mills Sidewalk extensions (\$50,000) and further improvements to The Grove (\$209,000).


For 2020, \$1.5 million has been allocated which includes the following major projects: Parkview Playground replacement (\$900,000), Commercial and Residential entryway signage (\$125,000) and the Wilson Mills Sidewalk extension (\$450,000).

OPERATIONS – This final category refers to the day-to-day operations of the Village. It includes the cost of personnel, equipment, vehicles, programs, etc. During 2019, \$1.0 million was committed, which includes the following major items: Parks and Recreation equipment and facilities maintenance (\$46,000), Service equipment and vehicles (\$147,000), Police equipment and vehicles (\$235,000) and Fire equipment and vehicles (\$481,000).

For 2020, \$1.7 million has been allocated which includes the following major items: Fire equipment and hydrant maintenance (\$111,000), Parks and Recreation equipment and facilities maintenance (\$85,000), Police equipment and vehicles (\$440,000) and Service equipment and vehicles (\$764,000).

Ward 4 Neighborhood Update

With the closing of all Mayfield Village public buildings, we are not able to schedule the Spring Ward 4 neighborhood meeting, however, please consider this an update on a few of the subjects that have been on our agenda:

Worton Park Flooding – Residents have reported that the heavy storms over the past two months caused flooding in homes in this area. This problem has been a continuing issue but I am pleased to let you know that a preliminary analysis was recently presented to Village officials.

The **Northeast Ohio Regional Sewer District's** (NEORS) Chagrin River Lake Erie Tributaries (CHALET) Master Plan Study is currently under way. As part of this study, **Wade Trim**, NEORS's engineering consulting firm, was tasked to analyze the Worton Park Neighborhood stream system. This analysis has identified some problem areas of flooding during the 100-year storm event. As part of Wade Trim's preliminary analysis, they have identified the need to enlarge some of the roadway culverts in the neighborhood. Also being investigated are possible alternatives to provide some storm water storage to help alleviate this flooding. In summary, there is progress being made and a commitment to figuring out how to resolve this problem. Thank you for your patience – stay tuned.

Deer Management – at our February Village Council meeting, it was brought up that the Highland Heights City Council recently passed legislation to authorize

deer culling in specific areas. This raised questions on how and why they came to this decision. It did start with a deer survey that showed 80% of the respondents believed something needs to be done to control the deer population.

There were other specific facts. Mayfield Village Police Chief Matias shared statistics comparing Highland Heights deer incidents to Mayfield Village over a 3-year period:

<u>2017 thru 2019</u>	<u>HHts</u>	<u>MV</u>
Incidents involving motor vehicles	145	27
Euthanized	40	9
Miscellaneous deer calls	86	5
Dead deer found on resident properties	49	25

Besides these enlightening facts, the closeness of homes in Mayfield Village is not conducive to deer culling as a solution as it is in specific areas within Highland Heights. That said, I committed to learning more about what was accomplished in Highland Heights to report back to Village Council, however, at this point in time it will not be a top priority. Stay tuned.

Traffic on Wilson Mills, Lander to SOM Center. After all the concerns and challenges over the years about the heavy traffic on Wilson Mills on school days and during work rush hour, it is now eerie and disheartening not to see cars, buses and trucks lined up each morning and late afternoon. So, as of now, let's look forward to rush hour returning real soon.

Stay safe and healthy – We will get through this together.

The Mayfield Village Fire Department is working with the Cuyahoga County Board of Health and neighboring communities to prepare for re-activation of a Mass Inoculation Point of Dispensing site (MIPOD).

Our local MIPOD was last used in December of 2009 in response to the H1N1 pandemic and could be used again, if activated by the Board of Health, for the mass dispensing of medication or vaccinating the public in response to a public health emergency. As we are now in a pandemic situation for COVID-19, the likelihood of a POD activation is increasingly possible.

If a vaccine, medication or mass testing becomes available, and MIPOD is activated by the Board of Health, a drive-thru site would be located on the Mayfield High School property to quickly serve as many people as possible.

RESIDENTS IN THE MAYFIELD SCHOOL DISTRICT ARE BEING ASKED TO VOLUNTEER TO ASSIST WITH STAFFING MIPOD.

In order to prepare, we are seeking both medical and non-medical volunteers to help with the following:

- *Traffic control*
- *Parking lot attending*
- *Record keeping and similar administrative tasks.*
- *Medical personnel to administer tests or vaccines*
- *Other positions yet to be determined*

Please share this information with family, friends and neighbors; the more it's circulated, the greater the number of volunteers we'll have available when needed. Food Waste & Recycling


Over 40% of all food in the United States ends up in a landfill. This wasted food is responsible for approximately 8% of global emissions. Producing food uses valuable resources and emits greenhouse gases at every stage from the farm to our table. Other lost resources are water, energy, land, and the labor used to bring us our food.

Food waste occurs at different stages. Retailers and consumers may reject "ugly" food that is bruised or blemished and consumers purchase, and prepare and serve, too much food.

All of us can play a role in reducing food waste. A local company, called Rust Belt Riders, has made it their goal to use food waste and turn it into mulch and soil. Mayfield Village is considering working with Rust Belt Riders to support food recycling. There are two available options. One is curbside pick-up of food waste or a centralized drop-off of food waste. The curbside service will utilize a bin with a compostable bag to collect the food. The drop-off will utilize a toter for the waste, in a specified location.

Please look for further information on the program in upcoming issues of the VOV. Rust Belt Riders has discontinued service during the COVID-19 pandemic, but will be back at work as soon as possible. 
