Memo from the Mayor / Brenda T. Bodnar

On Jan 6, 2020, three members of Council and I were inaugurated for our new four-year terms of office. Two new members of Council were elected this past November: Council-at-Large Representative Jennifer Juncisek and Ward 3 Representative Denny Murphy. Returning member, Ward 1 Representative Bill Marquardt, also took the oath of office for the sixth time.

I had the privilege of being sworn-in by Cuyahoga County Probate Court Judge Anthony J. Russo, a long-time resident of Mayfield Village. Judge Russo has served the Probate Court since 2009, and prior

Under Judge Russo's progressive leadership, the Probate Court has implemented many user friendly services, including e-filing, online viewing of court documents, legal assistance clinics, and satellite offices for marriage licenses. Judge Russo also appoints members of the Metroparks Board of Park Commissioners and under his leadership, the Metroparks have acquired over 2,000 acres of additional parkland. I am grateful to Judge Russo for his gracious comments prior to administering the oath of office to me.

I was then honored to administer the oath to Bill Marquardt and Denny Murphy, followed by Lyndhurst Municipal Court Judge Dominic Colletta, who administered the oath to Jennifer Juncisek. Alt-

hough Judge Colletta is newer to the bench than Judge Russo, his term of office has been marked with fairness, transparency and efficiency. Since taking office in 2018, Judge Colletta has made significant strides in modernizing our local court. Thanks to both judges for their tireless efforts to improve our community and for taking the time to attend our inauguration ceremony.

I wish to extend a sincere welcome to Denny Murphy and Jennifer Juncisek. I look forward to working with them, the other members of Council, and the members of my Administration as I begin my second term as your Mayor.

At the Council meeting on Tuesday, Jan 21, I had the honor of swearing in our various board, committee and commission members. I truly feel that the service of our Council members and volunteer constituents is an invaluable and essential part of our government, helping to lead us into this new decade, and keeping us on track and on pace. Rezoning Ordinances on March 17 Ballot

After successfully completing the steps set forth in the Mayfield Village Charter, two property owners in the Village will have issues on the March 17, 2020 ballot asking voters to change the current zoning classifications of their properties. These rezoning amendments have been designated as Issues 10 and 11.

Issue 10. The first property on the ballot for rezoning is located in front of 730 SOM Center Road. The property consists of two parcels and is known as the Georgian Center. The back parcel is currently leased by University Hospitals and is zoned Office Laboratory; the parcel fronting on SOM Center Road is zoned Single Family Residential. The property owner is seeking to expand the medical use onto the front parcel with the addition of an out-patient surgery center and a small medical office building. In order to do this, the property must be reclassified to Office Laboratory District.

With Council’s approval, the Village Administration entered into a Development Agreement to provide for specific terms for the new medical development, including: design criteria; height and size restrictions; operating hour restrictions and assurances that Village emergency services would not be overburdened.

Issue 11. The second property on the ballot is located at 6625 Wilson Mills and is the old Center School House property owned by the Mayfield School District. The building is located on SOM Center Road, next to the Community Room, but because the property is part of the Center School parcel, it has a Wilson Mills address. The School District has used this building for a variety of office and storage purposes over the years and, at this time, would like to divest itself of it as it has no use for the building and the School Dis-

tract no longer wants to expend funds to maintain it. The current zoning of this property is Single-Family Residential and the proposed reclassification is to Small Office Building District.

The old School House is on the National Registry of Historic Places, and the Small Office District zoning is the Village's most restrictive commercial district, so there are no major changes expected at the property. Currently, the building is being leased to two local businesses as office space, creating additional revenue to the Village and the School District. Additionally, if the rezoning is successful, the rezoned parcel will be split from the property containing Center School that will remain owned by the School District. As part of this parcel split, the School District, Village and buyer of the property have agreed to reciprocal parking and access easements in order to ensure that access and parking at Center School and the Mayfield Village Community Room are unaffected.

Both rezoning requests have been approved by the Planning & Zoning Commission and will be on the ballot for a vote of residents on March 17, 2020. The

language, as it is expected to be printed on the ballot, is shown below. If residents have any questions, they should contact the Village and we will do our best to provide answers.



As the old Center School House building is no longer needed by the Mayfield School District, the proposed use for it is for small offices. As the building is on the National Historic Registry, no substantial changes are expected if the rezoning is successful.

Inclusive Parkview Playground

Play can be defined as a verb: “to engage in activity for enjoyment and recreation rather than a serious or practical purpose.” Play can also be defined as a noun: “activity engaged in for enjoyment and recreation, especially by children.”

How would you describe play? When is the last time you experienced play?

Most adults think of play and only relate it to children. I believe play is for everyone and most of us need to play more!

Many of you already experience some type of recreation or play within the community. Mayfield Village has a variety of wonderful outdoor amenities: Parkview Pool, the Bruce G. Rinker Greenway Trail, Bocce Courts, Tennis Courts, Soccer Fields, Pavilions, Parkview Playground, Softball Fields and The Grove. And how fortunate to have North Chagrin Reservation as part of the Village!

I invite you to experience a new kind of play in Mayfield Village. By June 2020, there will be a unique inclusive Parkview Playground. Groundbreaking and construction will begin in late Winter. This playground will have fewer physical barriers and fresh equipment that all ages, abilities and generations can benefit from using. This will be unlike any other play feature in the area. Parkview Playground will include traditional features with added flare. There will be a larger variety of slides, an assortment of swings and a bigger sandbox with more diggers. Poured-in-Place surface has served the playground and its users well in the past

and it will be installed again. In addition, there will be many distinctive features included in this playground design such as:

- A swing in which an adult and child can swing together. This, in and of itself, transforms play into a brand-new experience.
- Large chimes in the center of the playground. While also making music, there is a strong vibration to be felt. Someone with difficulty hearing can feel the music being produced. There are other pieces of musical equipment as well within the playground.
- The seesaw can accommodate two to four people sitting in seats. With a flat top, other people will be able to sit on it and enjoy this feature without having to climb into a seat.
- Spinners, twirlers and gliders will be installed for all to enjoy various motions.
- By including some basic workout equipment as part of the playground, adults can get some exercise while their child is playing nearby. Walkers and runners can stop by and get in a quick workout along the way.
- A game area for cornhole, ping pong, checkers and chess.

The Parks and Recreation Department had already planned to replace Parkview Playground within a few years because it is over 20 years old. The Mayfield Village

Service Department has done a phenomenal job maintaining the playground equipment, but Parkview is used heavily and has seen a lot of wear and tear over the years. The average life expectancy of commercial playground equipment is twenty years.

Knowing the playground was nearing the end of its useful life, Mayfield Village budgeted \$500,000 for 2020 to replace the equipment at the playground. Last year, I had the opportunity to apply for two grants and Mayfield Village received nearly \$378,000 in funding from the State of Ohio, specifically from Nature Works and the Land and Water

Conservation Fund. The estimated total cost of the new Inclusive Parkview Playground is \$830,000. With the \$378,000 in grant money, Mayfield Village will spend approximately \$450,000—less than what was originally budgeted. The grant money, must be used and the project must be completed in 2020.

Mayfield Village is a beautiful area with amazing qualities that make it a desirable community to live in. Adding this inclusive playground will enhance the community and keep Mayfield Village on the forefront of creating top notch facilities and programs. The Parkview area is the heart of recrea-

tion in Mayfield Village. By creating this unparalleled playground, the opportunity for all to participate in play will be readily available.

Ohio's New Tobacco Laws

As of October 17, 2019 it is illegal to give, sell, or otherwise distribute cigarettes, other tobacco products, or alternative nicotine products like e-cigarette/vaping products to any person under the age of 21. There is no grandfathering clause, meaning that someone who could legally purchase tobacco products as an 18-20 year old in September 2019 can no longer do so until he or she reaches the age of 21. The types of products that are covered by the law, commonly referred to as the Tobacco 21 Law, include:

- Cigarettes
- Electronic smoking devices (vapes, e-cigs, tanks)
- Cigars
- Pipe tobacco
- Chewing tobacco
- Snuff
- Snus
- Dissolvable nicotine products
- Filters, rolling papers, pipes, blunts, or hemp wraps
- Liquids used in electronic smoking devices (whether or not they contain nicotine)

Vapor products (any component, part or additive that is intended for use in an electronic smoking device, a mechanical heating element, battery, or electronic circuit and is used to deliver the product)

When any of the above products are sold to anyone under the age of 21, both the person selling the product and the owner of the retail establishment may face

criminal penalties that increase after the first violation. A first offense is a third degree misdemeanor, punishable by up to a \$250 fine and/or 30 days in jail. If there is a second offense, the crime becomes a third degree misdemeanor, punishable by up to a \$500 fine and/or 60 days in jail.

The Tobacco 21 law also prohibits someone over 18 years of age, but less than 21, from knowingly furnishing false information concerning the person's name, age or other identification for the purpose of obtaining tobacco products. The penalties are the same as set forth above.

The Ohio Department of Health has an abundance of information about its Tobacco Use Prevention and Cessation Program, aimed at reducing the use of tobacco and nicotine-based products amongst Ohioans. Please visit odh.ohio.gov to learn more.

This past year, Executive Assistant Cheryl Garinger retired from her 31- year career in Mayfield Village. Cheryl began her career in 1988 as a Finance Clerk and assisted with Fire Department payroll and finances. Throughout her tenure, Cheryl volunteered at Cruise Night, Mother's Day Pancake Breakfast and the craft show.

In 2004, Cheryl became the Village's first full time Fire Department Executive Assistant. Shortly after, she was assigned a role in what would, in my opinion, be the largest accomplishment of her career—the development of the Mass Inoculation Point of Dispensing program, or (MIPOD). Cheryl worked with the Cuyahoga County Board of Health, The Mayfield School District, Mayfield area police and fire department Chiefs, and hundreds of volunteers to plan and successfully conduct multiple training events and a real-time activation for the H1N1 vaccination in De-

cember of 2009. The work and time that Cheryl put into this project paved the way for the program to succeed in her absence.

Throughout her career, Cheryl obtained multiple certifications to aid our community and the department including from FEMA National Incident Management System (NIMS) and Community Emergency Response Team (CERT). She attended state classes pertaining to Ohio Records Laws, and other various administrative and emergency-management oriented classes, and served as a Notary Public.

We at the department wish Cheryl and her family a safe and happy retirement and know that we will miss her presence here. We are, however, happy to announce her replacement, Jennifer Schultz.

Jennifer came to us from the Richmond Heights Police Department where she served as the Police Chief's Executive Assistant for the past 10 years. She also worked as the Detective Bureau secretary, and dispatcher before that. Jennifer has an Associate's degree and worked with Cheryl for approximately one month to ensure a seamless transition to filling her new position. In 2019 we held our first open house at the Police Station. It was a great success and we plan to have another open house in 2020.

Our Department participated in the "Pink Patch Project" and "No Shave November" fundraisers, where the Department raised \$3,545.00 for The Gathering Place and Cleveland Clinic Child-life Project.

Another first for the Police Department was our community seminars held in the fall. The seminar topics were Disaster Preparedness, Women's Self-Defense, a Drug Forum, and Crime Prevention. 

Home Values on the Rise in Mayfield Village

Change in median home sales price from 2018 to 2019



Recent trends in home sales prove what we already know: Mayfield Village is the best location around. Home values here in the Village have steadily risen after the great recession to their highest levels ever, and have now rebounded well past pre-recession levels.

A recent study by The Plain Dealer and cleveland.com shows that the median price for single-family homes increased in 2019 by an average of more than 6% across Cuyahoga County. Median suburban sales price surged to \$149,000, up from \$139,900 in 2018. Here in the Village, the news is even better – a lot better – as we enjoyed a 22% increase from 2018 to 2019, the second-highest yearly gain in the county. 50 homes transferred in Mayfield Village in 2019, with a median sale price of \$250,000, up from \$205,000 just a year earlier.

With the exception of a slight dip in prices in 2017, this momentum has been building for several years, and points to a healthy, desirable real estate market here in the Village, a trend we hope continues.

January 18-SAT. It was forecasted freezing rain, lots of snow and crummy weather.

On Friday, Dr. Shah and Elizabeth Bradford from Pittsburgh (Driver Employee of Rise against Hunger) were discussing on the phone whether to postpone the event. But Liz Bradford inspired Dr. Shah to wait until 5 am Saturday to make the final decision. At 5:30 am, Liz said "I am starting from Pittsburgh and will be in Mayfield Village by 9am." Two Village snow plow trucks arrived at 8:30 am to clean up the parking lot, walkway and driveway.

This was a unique event at the Mayfield Village Civic Center with 30 volunteers chipping in from 10am-2pm to stop Hunger. Volunteers unloaded three pallets from a rental truck driven from Pittsburgh, Pa.

1) Pallet carrying 50 lb. rice bags; 2) Pallet carrying 10 lb. bags of Soya beans; 3) Pallet carrying dry vegetables and lots of small/medium/large bins, mugs, weighing scales, heat guns etc.

At 10 am, there were 10 volunteers including **Ariya-9yrs old & Vishaan-11 yrs old**, grandchildren of Dr. Shah. By 11 am, there were 20 volunteers and, by closing, 30 volunteers. Very enthusiastic, smiling, giggling and having a great sense of joy, love & caring for hungry people from Honduras. They filled bags, weighed, sealed and put them in boxes.

By 2 pm, volunteers had packed **7,500 bags of meals for Honduras**. WOW! The event was so touching & inspiring that two more Rise against Hunger events have been planned in Parma, Ohio in April-May and another one in Kalamazoo, Michigan.



- **Try to be more physically active.** Talk with your doctor about the type of activities that would be best for you. If possible, aim to get at least 150 minutes of physical activity each week. Every day is best. It doesn't have to be done all at once. Come join a group-we offer Yoga, Zumba Gold, Line Dancing, Senior Exercise and new for 2020, Fit After Fifty.
- **Follow a heart-healthy diet.** Choose foods that are low in trans and saturated fats, added sugars, and salt. Eat plenty of fruits, vegetables, and foods high in fiber, like those made from whole grains. Chef Mary Beth prepares home cooked meals for Café Lunch and Lunch n Movie that are delicious and good for you!
- **Manage stress.** Learn how to manage stress, relax, and cope with problems to improve physical and emotional health. Tai Chi, yoga and knitting are all good stress busters- we are adding Zentangles, a meditative drawing technique, to our winter line up. If you need help with some of life's challenges, our social workers are ready to listen-call 216-291-3902 to set up a time to meet.
