ECONOMIC VALUE

- Parks and recreational facilities improve the local tax base and increase property values. Property values increase with proximity to parks. Increased property tax revenues improves local economies.
- “The real estate market consistently demonstrates that people are willing to pay larger amount for property close to parks and open space areas than for a home that does not offer this amenity”.
- Trees in cities save \$ in storm water retention.
- Quality parks and recreation are in top three reasons that businesses cite in relocation decisions.
- More important than fees and charges, parks and recreation programs provide indirect revenues to local and regional economies.



HEALTH & ENVIRONMENT

- Parks are the places people go to get healthy and stay fit.
- Park & Recreation programs reach across all age groups.
- Per CDC, access to parks will increase (25%) number of residents exercising at least three times per week.
- Parks improve water quality, protect groundwater, prevent flooding, improve air quality, buffer development, provide wildlife habitat, and provide a place to connect with nature and recreate outdoors together.


QUALITY OF LIFE

- Parks are a tangible reflection of the quality of life in a community. They provide identity for residents and are a major factor in the perception of quality of life in a community. Cited in surveys as one of the most important “livability” factors.
- Parks provide gathering places for families and social groups, as well as individuals of all ages and economic status, regardless of their ability to pay for access.
- Over past decade voter approval of ballot issues related to parks has exceeded 75%. Clearly, the majority of public views parks as essential priority for government spending.
- Parks have a value to communities that transcends the amount of dollars invested or revenues gained from fees. Parks provide a sense of public pride and cohesion.

Development of The Grove Committee

The Grove Committee met for the first time in October of 2012. It is an informal Mayor's advisory committee made up of Village residents who have an interest in working to develop this community asset.

Members of the Administration have assisted the Committee with its efforts to develop programming and determine infrastructure needs. The Committee has met regularly since its inception and its members have devoted substantial time volunteering at Grove events.

At its first meeting, the Grove Committee set its goals to include:

- Seeking feedback from the community to determine what types of programming are of interest;
- Organizing preliminary events to increase awareness of the site and its potential;
- Using this information to recommend short-term and long-term infrastructure needs and future programming; and
- Expanding recreational opportunities in the cultural arts/Grove as part of "public service".

Where were we then?



Open House – June 22, 2013

In May 2013, the Committee mailed flyers to all Village residents and businesses, inviting feedback for future programming and announcing an Open House to see the new park and venue. Over 100 people attended.



Survey Results

The Committee developed and distributed a survey to determine the types of programming the community desires at this new venue. The results are as follows:

- #11 Dances (36%)



Making The Grove a true community asset

Over the past weekend, Mayfield Village officials held an open house for the village's newest facility — The Grove, an amphitheater located at 425 North Commons Blvd. Work is still being done at the facility, but the idea is once the facility is complete, a number of community programs can be held there.

At the open house, residents got a sneak peek at what the amphitheater will look like when completed. They also learned about some of the introductory programs planned for later this summer and were given an opportunity to provide feedback on the types of programming they would like to see offered at the facility.

Right off the bat, it should be apparent to anyone who attended that The Grove is ideally situated among many community attractions in Mayfield Village. It is just north of Parkway Pool, a popular spot to beat the summer heat. It is also near the village's softball and soccer fields and the new Mayfield branch of the Cuyahoga County Public Library, which opened two months ago on SOM Center Road and has already seen a 40 percent increase in circulation in its first full month of operation.

The library is proving its willing to drive a short distance to take advantage of those who patronize the new corner from the above-it as community gathering spot. It is certainly poised to join an entertainment hub for the

area dance studio. On Sept. 7, an outdoor yoga demonstration and a nature walk in the

nearby North Chagrin Reservation will take place. And on Sept. 22, an event called "Lincoln at the Grove" will pay homage to the Civil War era with live music from that time period, displays of Civil War artifacts and impersonators of presidents Abraham Lincoln, Ulysses S. Grant and James A. Garfield.

A full lineup of programming is slated to begin in 2014, and feedback the village has already received from residents indicates a plethora of activities could be on tap for next year and beyond. Among the ideas being considered for The Grove are art festivals, farmers markets, dances, health and wellness programs, lectures, movies, live concerts and, in the winter, sledding and skating.

Residents are encouraged to offer their feedback on The Grove and how it should be used. MAYFIELD — Preliminary programming at the village's new amphitheater will begin soon, with a community open house scheduled from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. June 22 at the Parkway Pool parking lot.

Mayfield Village is looking for community input for the new outdoor amphitheater and green space called The Grove.

On Saturday, residents from The Grove Committee will host an open house for the community to learn more about the new venue.

Garry Regan, chairman of The Grove Committee, said the event is an invitation for people to see it and get feedback on the space.

"We will be giving tours, handing out flyers for upcoming events, passing out surveys, and getting community ideas about what events people would like to see happen (at The Grove)," Regan said. "We will be showing peo-

ple where we plan to put seating, a pergola, and the sledding hill, to show (our) vision (for the space)."

The idea for The Grove came from people who expressed an interest in a place where the community could relax and enjoy outside entertainment.

"This is a wonderful opportunity and (the committee) is excited to bring something fun, educational, and informative (to Mayfield Village)," he said.

The venue has been a work in progress for many years, and Mayfield Village is looking to enhance the space with lighting, basic stage, pathways and draining.

Mayfield Village first decided to transform the area back in 1999 as part of the Village's Greenway Corridor project. Construction started in 2008 when dirt was deposited in the area that would begin to form the grounds

for the amphitheater.

Regan said, "the events and use of space is limitless, from concerts to art festivals to corporate meetings."

In the future, the committee plans to work with the new library and the Metroparks for programming ideas. There are four programs scheduled in August and September to show the

types of events the space will host. They are:

- Aug. 24: "Dancing Under The Stars" with live big band orchestra
 - Aug. 25: Dance performance by "The Dance Stop Studio"
 - Sept. 7: Outdoor Yoga and Nature Walk
 - Sept. 22: Civil War historical event called "Lincoln at The Grove."
- Full programming is expected for 2014.

The open house will be from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the parking lot of Parkway Pool, 425 N. Commons Blvd. Residents are encouraged to come and share any thoughts, comments, and ideas.

Mayfield's grassy amphitheater opens with big band music

When workmen removed tons of dirt to create new athletic fields five years ago, they questioned where the dirt should go.

Mayor Bruce Rinker told them to dump the dirt over by the village's new pool because he envisioned a grassy amphitheater where people could gather to dance, listen to music, plays and other events.

On Aug. 24, the vision was realized as the Grove hosted its first performance, "Dancing Under The Stars," with the big band music of the Swing Band.

It is nothing fancy, just a bowl-shaped valley of rich grass with plenty of room to lie back and appreciate nature.

"I'm excited," said Garry Regan, one of the people Rinker tapped to bring this amphithe-

ater dream to life.

The three-acre swatch of green is at 425 N. Commons Blvd., just outside the Parkway Pool, and all activities are free.

Regan, who ran the Cain Park amphitheater in Cleveland Heights in the 1970s, was asked by the mayor to help turn the large hills of dirt into something special. He was part of a committee that put together the plan.

Regan said he is used to doing something with nothing, or very little. He said the village donated \$50,000 to turn the grassy knoll into something special for this year's opening.

It includes biking and hiking paths that hook up to the North Chagrin Reservation. Another \$50,000 next year will be used to bring electricity to the park, to replace the jury-rigged system now in place.

"We expect it to grow and grow," Regan said.

Upcoming events include Outdoor Yoga, from 8-11 a.m. Saturday. Instructors from Cleveland Yoga will train beginning and experienced students in the ancient art.

On Sept. 22, there will be a series of historically themed events, starting at 11 a.m. with a display of Civil War artifacts in recognition of the 150th anniversary of the war.

At 12:30, Ed Haney and Debbie Weinkamer of Mentor portray James and Lucretia Garfield engaged in an historical chat. At 1 p.m., William Vodrey, of Shaker Heights, will give a speech about Abraham Lincoln at Gettysburg and at 3 p.m. Lincoln himself will address the crowd, courtesy of actor Mel Maurer of Westlake.

Also that day, the Federal

Rebels will perform Civil War era music at 2 p.m. and at 2:45 p.m., President Ulysses S. Grant will speak about matters of state, through actor Tom Miller of Mentor.

Regan said there is no contingency for food at the site, so he hopes food trucks from the area take advantage of the opportunity. When the snow falls, the amphitheater will be a sledding run as Regan and his volunteer pander what to do in 2014.

"Concerts, movies, dances, plays, many other ideas are being considered," he said. "I'd like to see an arts festival and a health fair here next summer. We have already spoken with the people at the Great Lakes Shakespeare Festival about coming here. We have been approached by many music bands."

"It can be whatever we want it to be."
